This is a very important suit as it will no doubt go to the supreme court and be made a test case. The land in question was bought from the state and the interest on one of the payments was allowed to remain unpaid for one year and eight months. As one year is the limit the land would naturally revert to the state and therefore become vacant, but the State Land Board have made a custom of accepting payment and issuing certificates, if made within two years, although there appears to be no law that will warrant them in doing so.

Mr. Robertson made application for the land but was refused by the state and as he contends that the land, according to the law, was vacant at the time of his application, he has brought this suit. The case will be watched with interest.

Nelson Dumm, who is living with his father-in-law, Mr. S. H. Patterson about six miles from Bonanza, had a very serious accident last Thursday. While drilling in some grain his team became frightened and while attempting to gain control of them he was kicked by one of the horses and knocked down. EXCURSION ON KLAMATH LAKE.

A. C. Griffith will start the first excursion of the season for Odessa and Pelican bay, on Saturday, June 20. The big two-deck steamboat, has been greatly improved, with new machinery, so that it will make much better time. The excursion will leave Saturday morning and in the evening they will hold a dance at Odessa. On Sunday they will take a cruise up Crystal creek and to Pelican bay and make the return trip on Monday afternoon. There will be first class accommodations with plenty of row boats at the resort. The steamer will easily carry 150 or more.

MAP OF CRATER LAKE PARK

Since the Southern Pacific Railroad has begun organizing excursions to Crater Lake the demand for a map of the region has greatly increased, and to meet this demand the Crater Lake special map, prepared by the United States Geological Survey, has been brought up to date and so extended as to represent the whole of the Crater Lake National Park, on the scale of 1 mile to an inch. The map is now ready for distribution.

The elevations and depressions are shown by contours representing vertical intervals of 100 feet. To denote the very steep inner slope of the great depression containing the lake the contours are crowded close together; to show the outer gentler slope they are far apart.

The soundings of the lake are marked on the map, and its greatest depth, nearly 2000 feet, makes it the deepest fresh water lake in the United States. On the back of the map is a description, by J. S. Diller, of the geological features and history of Mount Mazama including the eruption of its lava flows and pumice, its glaciation, and its final engulfment, which produced the great caldera, on the bottom of which arose a small volcanic cone that now forms Wizard Island, in the lake. Three excellent views are given; one of the western part of the rim, from a photograph by Burton L. Cunningham of Ashland; another shows Mount Mazama restored; and a third is a view of a model which makes the depression containing the lake very impressive. The price of the map is five cents.
