TRAINING STABLES.
You will notice in another column the advertisement of Armstrong & Ramsby. These gentlemen have just had built on Seventh street, back of Hazen's livery, a fine line of stables, which are being fitted in first class style for the accommodation of running and trotting horses.

The stables are arranged in the form of a triangle and face toward the lake. When completed there will be about forty stalls and these will be perfectly fitted in up-to-date style, so that any owner leaving his horses with these gentlemen can feel assured that they will receive the best of care and proper training. They will also receive colts for developing.
This is something that Klamath Falls has needed for some time and more especially since the new race track has been built, as there are a number of first class horses in this county that have lacked the opportunity for proper training. Besides, owners of outside horses object to bringing their race horses here unless they are able to get proper accommodations. There is no reason now why we should not be able to secure plenty of good horses for our fall races, as we have one of the best trainers in Southern Oregon, and the association will offer some good purses this fall.
SEWER WATER.
For some reason the water supplied by our waterworks company has been affected for the past month. The company certainly has been given sufficient time to attend to this matter, if they intend to do so, and we believe that it is time for the citizens to make a kick and a good strong one at that, as we have one coming. If the board of health or some one does not see that the city has purer drinking water, the first thing we know there will be an epidemic of malaria and typhoid. The condition of the water at present will certainly breed disease. We cannot understand why the water company have neglected to pay any attention to these conditions, as we can hardly believe that they expect us to drink sewer water all summer. The town ought to insist that it be attended to at once, as there is simply no excuse whatever why our water should not be as pure now as in past years.
