July 4th saw the completion of the Pacific cable which enables telegraphic communication around the world. On that day President Roosevelt sent a message around the world in twelve minutes.

All will agree that it would not dampen patriotic fervor to eliminate cannon firecrackers and dangerous explosions from Fourth of July celebrations, when it is known that about 3000 people were accidentally killed on that day this year by the various contrivances with which to make a big noise.

The warships of the American Squadron, under command of Rear-Admiral Cotton, will be guests of England this week, and elaborate preparations have been made to properly entertain their officers and men. In hospitality England will doubtless vie with Germany whose treatment of the American visitors was most cordial and generous.

Excessive rains and destructive floods have abated in the east only to be followed by intense, death-dealing heat. People who are frying their heads under the sun's fierce rays, would appreciate the cool, invigorating climate of Klamath where one can venture away from the shadow of an ice-water tank without the possibility of being roasted and prostrated.

John Barrett, of Portland, has been honored by appointment as minister to Argentine Republic to succeed ex-Governor William P. Lord, of Oregon. Mr. Barrett is a journalist of ability and has had experience in the diplomatic service at Siam. People of Oregon will be glad to have the U. S. ministerial post at Argentine kept in the hands of an Oregon man.

Senator Mark Hanna has reduced his business responsibilities for the purpose of devoting more time to politics. He is a big success as a campaign manager and proposes to make his power felt in the future as he has in the past. One thing, however, he couldn't do—injure the presidential boom of President Roosevelt, and he was wise enough not to persist, and is now one of the president's staunchest supporters. But as a combatant in the political arena, he has few equals.

The water power, going to waste in Klamath county, is an exhaustless source of future utility. The numerous falls, unsurpassed this side of Niagara, will in time be harnessed and set to work generating electricity which increases steadily in popular use for light, heat and mechanical energy. To lift water for irrigation, propel cars and boats, furnish light and heat, electricity is the growing power, and nowhere can it be more easily created than in Klamath county. In time every rancher, as well as townmen, will enjoy the benefits of electricity.

A board of trade is an organization very much needed in the growing town of Klamath Falls. Let business men who are interested in development, get together and form one. The united efforts of our leading citizens would accomplish results that would add inestimably to the welfare of the town and county. It would be the business of the board to encourage railroads, irrigation, county fairs and all laudable and beneficial enterprises. It would advertise the resources of the county by issuing suitable printed matter and by keeping samples of our products on exhibition at Portland. It would lend co-operation to any undertaking in the line of progress. Such an organization is a pressing need here now.

### POPE LEO DYING.

Pope Leo XIII has been hovering between life and death at the Vatican in Rome this week. He was stricken Sunday with pneumonia and his condition since then has grown gradually worse. Attending physicians hold out no hope for his recovery.

News by wire this morning states that the Pope is still alive, but very weak and that the end may be expected at any time. He fully realizes the seriousness of his illness and is perfectly resigned.

In the event of his death, which now seems only a question of a brief time, his successor will be chosen from the College of Cardinals, comprising seventy members.

### THE GLORIOUS FOURTH.

The weather was ideal on the Fourth. The sun shone from an Italian sky and the elements were neither too hot nor too cold. All nature seemed resplendent and bent on handing out the best brand of weather in stock. Accordingly, people could enjoy the open air and none failed to do so.

It was a quiet day in Klamath Falls. There was no public celebration, and those who remained here contented themselves with rest and the sociability of relatives and neighbors.

At Fort Klamath and Klamath Agency crowds gathered from all parts of the county. The whites had prepared grounds for a celebration on one side of Wood river and the Indians had pitched tents and erected a grand stand on the other side. The parade was the opening public feature and was very attractive, reflecting credit on all who participated. The usual liberty wagon was followed by a band of warriors, all arrayed in feathers and paint and trying to show how the ancient tribes acted when they were out for a fight.

The formal program, commemorative of the day, was introduced by music from the Agency school band. Capt. O. C. Applegate gave the oration, expressing the spirit of the occasion in well chosen words. Rev. Jesse Kirk followed with an appropriate address. The Declaration of Independence was read by Mr. LaPoint. The program which was interspersed by both instrumental and vocal music, proved highly pleasing to the big audience.

After sumptuous picnic dinners, the horse races and ball game were called and held the attention of a large share of the crowd. The races were interesting and showed plenty of rivalry for the purses. Chief interest, however, centered in the ball game between the Klamath Falls and Fort Klamath clubs. The result was 32 to 27 in favor of the Falls boys. Thus, considering the score, neither side showed much skill, a fact attributed to the strong wind that was blowing and the rough ground on which they played. Here is the lineup and score:

Both teams played well, but the Falls club from the start and proved the Indians unequal to the match. The Falls boys were in excellent trim and each man demonstrated the real merit that he possessed. The pitching and fielding were exceptionally good.

A large number participated in a dance at Bonanza on the evening of the Fourth. A pleasant time is the verdict of all who attended.

AT YAINAX.

There was a big celebration at Yainax, attended chiefly by the Indians. There was a program of speeches and music, followed by feasting, dancing and a general good time. Tall Tom, an Indian, was the orator of the day. A war dance by old members of the tribe was an interesting feature.

### MAP OF THE UNITED STATES.

Attention is called to the fact that a wall map of the United States, prepared under the direction of the Commissioner of the General Land Office, has been issued for sale by the department. In addition to usual map features on this are shown the several acquisitions of territory upon this continent by the Government of the United States, by clearly defined boundaries, as determined by the latest investigations, all military, naval, Indian, forest, and timber reservations, private land claims, and the location of all United States Land Offices and offices of the United States Surveyors-General. Along its lower border are small maps of Cuba, Porto Rico, Pine Island, the Hawaiian Group, Guam, the Philippines, and the Tutuila Group of the Samoan Islands. This map is about 5 by 7 feet in size, mounted on muslin and attached to rollers ready for immediate use, and is sold for 80 cents per copy.

The Department also publishes separate maps of the several States and Territories in which public lands of the United States are located. These separate maps are unmounted and about 2 by 3 feet in size (excepting those of Alaska, California and Florida, which are about twice this size), and are sold at 12 cents per sheet.

The law permits the sale of only one copy to an individual, but to schools and other institutions as many copies can be furnished as may be desired for separate buildings or departments.

Maps sold by the Department are sent by registered mail postage free to purchasers.

All remittances in payment for maps should be by draft or postal money order made payable to the order of the Financial Clerk, Department of the Interior.
