The Klamath Lake Navigation company of Klamath Falls, has filed its articles of incorporation with the Secretary of state at Salem. The capital stock is \$10,000 and the incorporators are S. V. Short, G. H. Woodbury and E. E. Upmeyer. The company is preparing to ply gasoline launches on the Klamath lakes, and the boats are expected here within a few days.

Probably no heavier snow storm occurred during last winter than was witnessed last Monday morning July 6th. It came down in large flakes and soon covered the ground to the depth of 1 of an inch. Trees were laid to the ground with the heavy load, and many were broken down. It was a scene rarely witnessed and one that people could not believe unless they saw it with their own eyes.—Lakeview Examiner.

Steel, promoter of the coming excursion to Crater lake, has not made definite arrangements for transportation of the party via the Rogue river road and that there is a good prospect of persuading the excursion to be made by way of the Klamath Lake railroad and Klamath Falls. The trip this way will cost less, be more comfortable and more attractive in scenery than any other route. All should unite in efforts inducing Mr. Steel to bring his party through here.

Failure to secure a millsite where a sufficient amount of water to supply the boilers is insured has delayed the setting up of the big new sawmill near the terminus of the Klamath river railroad at Pokegama, by Potter & Son. The machinery has been on the ground for some time and a site was selected and excavations for a dam made and about eight feet of water secured in it but the supply failed with the coming on of the dry weather and made the selecting of a new site necessary.—Ashland Tidings.

We have been requested by a number of Tule Lake residents to call attention to the necessity for grading the hill near the Wilson bridge. This is bound to be the main traveled road for people of that section but with the hill as steep as it is at present, it is about impossible to make the grade with any size load. We have made inquiries and are pleased to state that we were reliably informed that a new bridge will be built and also work will soon commence on the grading of the hill. The contract for the bridge was let in the spring to Wm. Flackus for \$1750.

Moore's Comedians closed their six nights engagement in Lakeview last night. They met with all the success that was expected, which was a crowded house every night, and some

nights people were turned away on account of room. They think they were not treated fairly in having the houses raised to \$25 per night, and claim they will bring the matter before the circuit court if the matter is not returned. The eleventh annual assembly of the Southern Oregon Chautauqua Association opened in Ashland yesterday and will continue ten days. Among leading attractions will be addresses by Senator J. P. Dooliver and Hon. Champ Clark, and an entertainment by Karl Germaine, the magician. Monday's Tidings contained a four-page supplement giving a complete program of the sessions and other appropriate matter. There is a larger attendance this year than ever. In fact, the Ashland Chautauqua has grown in popular interest from the date of its organization and now is looked forward to by all of Southern Oregon as one of the most enjoyable occasions, educationally and socially, of the year.

A minstrel show—not Haverly's, but one of equal merit, if not equal renown—held forth in the opera house last evening. It was what might be termed a recherche event, intended particularly for the bon ton of the town, and a large crowd heartily responded. The singing was transcendent, the jokes were fresh and toothsome, and the ghost production was superlative—an exquisite novelty that wrung shrieks of applause from the gilded audience. FUNERAL OF A. A. FITCH.
The funeral of the late A. A. Fitch occurred Friday at 1 o'clock p. m. The services were conducted by Rev. Smith and were held at the grave in the Klamath Falls cemetery.

A large crowd from Bly, Dairy and Bonanza were present, also many people from Klamath Falls and vicinity. The deceased was a native of Michigan, coming to Klamath county in 1888 where he engaged in the sawmill business near Dairy. In June, 1891, he was elected sheriff of Klamath county and was re-elected in 1896. Mr. Fitch was 43 years and 9 months old at the time of his death and is survived by a wife and two children, who reside at Hildebrand, and a brother, E. E. Fitch, of Bly.
