At the last session of Congress Senator Quarles, of Wisconsin, introduced a bill in the Senate to repeal the Stone and Timber Act and the commutation clause of the Homestead Act. This was defeated in the House of Representatives. Now Congressman Esch, of La Crosse, Wis., has just made a trip through the coast states, to study and investigate the advisability of repealing these laws, as the bills are almost certain to come up at the next session. It seems rather surprising that these brilliant men should waste so much of their valuable time promoting legislation that can in no way affect their own state and which certainly will after a tew more forest reserves, be decidedly unnecessary so far as the western states are concerned. If the government does not wish to dispose of its timber lands why does it throw them open for settlement? And again, if \$2.50 an acre is too cheap they might raise the price. If they want to sell it certainly cannot matter who are the buyers as long as the government gets the money. Besides these acts if left in force might aid materially valuero six acquero six in helping settling Alaska.

SWIFT JUSTICE A REMEDY.

In a recent letter President Roosevelt commends Governor Durbin, of Indiana, for the attitude he assumed recently respecting the lynching at Evansville. He also expresses his own opinion in regard to mob violence as follows:

"All men must feel the gravest alarm over the growth of lynching in this country and especially over the peculiarly hideous forms so often taken by mob violence when colored men are the victims, on which occasions the mob seems to lay most weight, not on the crime, but on the color of a criminal, in a portion of these cases the man lynched has been guilty of a crime terrible, horrible beyond de-Gity Meat Market scription, a crime so horrible that as far as he himself is concerned, he has sympathy whatsoever.

But it cannot be necessary in order to accomplish this to deprive any citizen of the fundamental rights to be heard in his own defense, which are so dear to us and which lie at the root of our liberty. It certainly ought to be possible, by the proper administration of the laws, to secure swift vengeance upon the criminal, and immediate efforts of all Legislators, Judges and citizens should be addressed to securing such reforms in our legal proced-BONANZA, OREGON. ure as to leave no vestige of excuse for those misguided men who undertake to reap vengeance through vioent methods
