ABUSE OF FOREST RESERVE.

"This sneering of reserves," said Representative J. N. Williamson, "over one-fourth of the map of the state, promiscuously and arbitrarily, without regard to the welfare of the communities affected, is what I call abuse of the forest reserve policy. The Cascade reserve has been and will be a benefit. Certain regions of the Blue mountains might also be set aside to advantage. The reserve system well used should be commended; abused it should be condemned."
"The paramount need of Oregon is the development of more resources and the enlargement of fields of industry. The man who understands the needs of this state sees that its progress will be retarded by creation of the proposed reserves."
"Now look at the proposed reserve in Southern Crook county and Northern Lake and Klamath. The good lands are all taken up and the poor lands, whose use is necessary to the development of the good, are to be reserved. Industrial projects are hesitating, in doubt about the privileges they will have on the intermediate lands. Why put such a ban on progress in a region whose energies are striving to get loose?"
"The policy behind the creation of these reserves is altogether wrong. Its objects are ill-advised. Its effects are misjudged."
"People in Interior Oregon don't know what to make of it. And their grievance is the same as that of the people of all western states. I tell you that this reserve business is getting to be a live issue. It is the substance of the conversation of all classes of citizens. And when so many persons raise protest, they are to be reckoned with. Hundreds and thousands of acres are withdrawn that are not sources of water supply. Miles and miles of land are withdrawn that contain dry sand or scattered pines. And yet preservation of water supply is the pretext of their withdrawal."

"We've gone far enough creating reserves. Now let's stop."
Mr. Williamson drew attention to the fact that Oregon is entitled to more than \$3,000,000 of the reclamation fund for irrigation projects. About \$900,000 of this was collected in this state from sales of land under the timber and stone act, and from commutation of homestead entries in the first year of the new irrigation law. Last year the collections were more than \$2,000,000.

"Now," said Mr. Williamson, "let's have several big irrigation projects in Oregon; not one or two surveys and a few withdrawals, but actual construction. The people of this state have a right to ask that the government begin this work at once. This matter should be one of the chief cares of the Oregon delegation at Washington next winter. We members of congress from Oregon are no good if we can't get one or two projects started here."—Oregonian, August 22.

LORD SALISBURY DEAD.

Robert Arthur Talbot Gascoigne Cecil, Marquis of Salisbury, the great English Conservative leader since the death of Lord Beaconsfield, died at Hatfield House, Saturday, Lord Salisbury, who was born February 13, 1830, entered public life as a member of Parliament in 1853, and has since been very prominent in English political history, succeeding Gladstone as Premier in 1885, resigning after a brief tenure, his party being defeated at the polls. In 1896 the Conservatives were again successful and he was again called as Prime Minister. He resigned in 1892 and again came into power in 1895.
The ex-Premier, though retired from political life, was an important figure in many public ways. He was a warden of the Cinque Ports, high steward of Westminster and Chancellor of Oxford University. His death places an order of Knight of the Garter at the disposal of King Edward.

ASHLAND STAGE RUNAWAY.

The Ashland stage had quite a bad runaway Monday evening, shortly after leaving Chase's station. Among the passengers were C. D. Morgan, wife and three children, Frank Kincaid and J. H. Lewis, a timber locator from Roseburg. The cause of the accident was due to the breaking of the lead rig, which had been

changed at Chase's, substituting in place of the spreaders an old pair of levers, which had to be fastened to the lead rod with wire. At a sudden jerk of the levers the wire broke and the driver was pulled from his seat, falling between the pole team. The horses then became frightened and started running but were stopped after going a short distance by the wagon striking a stump. Mr. Morgan, who was attempting to get hold of the lines, was thrown under the stage, which passed over his legs. His wife and the children remained in the wagon and fortunately were not injured.

Mr. Kincaid and Lewis jumped from the rig as soon as the horses started running and attempted to stop them but on account of the darkness and clouds of dust were not able to do so until the team was checked by running into the stump. The driver was not hurt except being badly shaken up. Mr. Morgan is a brother of R. M. Morgan, of Fort Klamath and he and his family were on their way here on a visit from their home in Boise City, Idaho. This makes the third accident on the stage lines between here and Pokegama during the last few days.
