LAKEVIEW HAS A SIMILAR CASE.

If Senators Do Not Act Soon, President Will Pick His Own Men. OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Aug. 29.—The Oregonian correspondent has very good authority for making the statement that unless Senators Mitchell and Frazier within a "reasonable time" recommend two men for appointment as Register and Receiver at the Lakeview Land Office, President Roosevelt will appoint his successors to Register and Receiver Bailey in the same manner as he yesterday appointed E. W. Davis Register at Grande.

Secretary Hitchcock has concluded that Brattain and Bailey must be relieved. They have each served more than four years, and their record is not such as to satisfy the secretary. He has requested the Senators to recommend new men, and as yet nothing has been heard in response to his request. If, as was intimated recently in The Oregonian, the delegation unites in recommending J. N. Watson for Register and C. U. Snider for Receiver, it is quite probable these men will be appointed.

KLAMATH'S WOOL CROP.

Nearly a Quarter of a Million Pounds of Wool Grown in Klamath County This Year. This has been the banner year in Klamath county for the sheep and wool business. It is estimated we now have about 20,000 sheep or nearly four times the amount of last year. Dave Edler is our heaviest wool grower with nearly 100,000 pounds; then comes Applegate & Stoble, E. I. & F. L. Applegate and John Smart with probably 25 to 30 more smaller growers. From information given us by some of the best informed wool men in the county we find that there will be about 215,000 pounds of wool shipped from here this year. Edler's wool was handled by Massengill of Lakeview and we are informed was shipped to Boston. E. W. Gowen of Klamath Falls bought 79,000 pounds which he shipped to San Francisco. The price paid was from 12 1/2 to 14 cents delivered at Klamath Falls or Merrill.

LETTER FROM SULTAN.

President Roosevelt now knows what the Sultan of Morocco thinks of him. The letter from the Sultan, brought by J. W. Langerman, commissioner from Morocco, to the St. Louis fair, which was presented to the President, together with a fine Arabian saddle, was written in Arabic. Mr. Langerman has had it translated for the President. This is what the Sultan wrote: To the honored President of the great American nation: May God keep him in peaceful preservation. In the name of God, the merciful and everlasting, life and strength are the outcome of God's great love. From the servant of his great and mighty God, the great and powerful vanquished, the faithful, the son of the faithful, may God enquire him with the splendor of his greatness, keep him victorious and extend unto him greatness. To the great, loving and exalted in his position of splendor and glory, first among the great and noble. The President of the great American nation, the mirror of its greatness, possessor of its highest position, Theodore Roosevelt. After saluting and thanking the great almighty God, unique and unequalled in greatness and fullness and honor, and after showering upon thee and upon thy great and exalted position all that which may be due to thee, in unspoken words we may state that there came before our noble presence your wise messenger, James W. Langerman, the chevalier, who came unto us to have us appoint one who may represent us in the dedication and opening of the exposition which your great government graciously purposed and consented to open in the coming year, 1904, if it pleases the mighty God. And we have appointed him to represent our noble self at the beautiful exposition in due time, if it pleases the mighty God.

POWERS GUILTY.

GEORGETOWN, Ky., Aug. 29.—The jury in the case of ex-Secretary of State Caleb Powers, charged with complicity in a conspiracy to murder Governor William Goebel in January, 1900, to-day found the defendant guilty and imposed the death sentence. Powers was sentenced to imprisonment for life in his former trials for complicity in the conspiracy. It was on his motion that he secured the new trials each time. The verdict to-day caused great excitement among the friends of other defendants in these cases.
