ABOUT THE NEW DITCH.

We submit the following which is a copy of one of the letters being sent by E. Brong to parties who signed the contract for the big irrigation canal.

PORTLAND, OR., Sept. 9th 1903. Dear Sir and Madame: We take this method of notifying you that our company have decided to build the irrigation canal; according to the contract entered into by yourselves and myself, on the 16th day of May, 1903, and expect to commence actual construction work at an early enough date to complete said canal and its laterals, before the time limit expires. I also desire to notify you that all land owners coming under the said proposed canal, that have not already contracted for water have the opportunity to do so under the present terms up to November 15th, 1903, but on and after that date, water privileges with our company will be \$15.00 per acre, payable one-third the amount upon delivery of water; one third in one year and one-third in two years, with interest at seven per cent, with a maintenance of one dollar per acre, from the time of delivery of water.
