WILL POOL THEIR TIMBER. Many Owners of Timber Land in Klamath County Will Enter a Combine.

The large number of Albany people holding timber claims in Klamath County have determined to pool their claims.

In order to prevent the buying up of desirable pieces of timber by outside men, thus preventing the purpose of the pool, which is to sell the entire tract at once, the new organization will purchase claims of any who are not able to hold until the desired price may be obtained.

4600 TONS OF HAY LOST. Lower Chewaucan Marsh Burns and Destroyed \$30,000 Worth of Hay and Pasture Land.

News reached Lakeview Tuesday evening that the lower Chewaucan marsh was afire and that thousands of tons of hay in the stack and bunched, besides thousands of acres of pasture and meadow land had been destroyed by the fiery demon.

Fire started Monday near the lower ZX ranch, but the fire was presumably put out and everything was considered safe, but Tuesday the wind came up and soon fanned the smouldering sparks into a mountain flame which soon spread to the adjoining ranches of Heryford Bros. and Brattain Bros.

Just as we go to press a message is received from Felix Green, who with W. P. Heryford went to Chewaucan Wednesday morning, to the effect that the fire is raging again and asks everybody in Lakeview who can go to Chewaucan and help fight the fire.

The situation at this time looks more serious than before. Many men are responding to the call, and wagon loads are going.

Heryford Bros. are said to have lost 12 large stacks of hay, containing over 100 tons each, besides about 2300 tons of hay, cut and bunched in the field.

Brattain Bros. loss is 2 stacks, or about 300 tons, and about 500 tons of hay bunched, making a loss of \$4,000.

The ZX loss is not known exactly, but one or two stacks are known to have been burned and it is supposed that some bunched hay was lost.

The total loss in the marsh will be from \$25,000 to \$30,000. The loss is irreparable, and comes quite severe on the Heryfords and Brattains who have cattle to feed.

Whether they have hay sufficient on their other ranches is not yet known, but it is presumed not. If not, it will necessitate them buying more hay, which is not overly plentiful any place this fall.

CATTLE NEWS.

Mitchell Bros. started about 300 head of beef cattle for the railroad Sunday morning. They went by way of Keno to Gallezelle, Cal.

L. J. Straw brought down a herd of yearlings from the Fort the first of the week. He took them to the Miller ranch where he will winter them.

J. W. Howard, the Lake County Cattle King, arrived in the city Monday and will probably remain here the rest of the fall. Mr. Howard will feed from 2300 to 2500 head of cattle in the Klamath Basin this season.

Frank O. Bunting of Lakeview arrived in the city Saturday from Salem. While at the State Fair he secured one of C. B. Wade's fine Hereford bulls.

Ryan & Butler and Pelton & Sizemore, of Fort Klamath sold 200 head of steers to Mitchell Bros Friday. The price paid was \$2 cents.

WARNER SETTLERS LOSE.

The famous Warner Valley case which has been hanging fire for the past 29 years has finally been settled as far as the Interior Department is concerned.
