11,000 ACRES SWAMP LAND. Big Tract in Klamath County Bought From the State at \$1 an Acre to Be Reclaimed.

A Salem dispatch in Saturday's Oregonian says: The sale of a block of 11,000 acres of swamp land in Klamath county, by the State Land Board, marks the beginning of an enterprise which is expected to add 100,000 acres of the best kind of pasture land to the resources of that section of the state.

While the tract was sold in separate parcels of not exceeding 320 acres to one purchaser, it is understood that under an association of interests reclamation work will be conducted on a larger scale than has ever been undertaken before in Oregon.

For the sale of the land the state received \$1 per acre, or \$11,000. The purchasers intend to construct a floating dredge at an expense of \$10,000 and build dikes and ditches at an expense of \$50,000, by means of which the tule marsh will be drained to such an extent that it will make excellent pasture lands.

The persons who have undertaken this enterprise have been working quietly and intended to acquire the whole tract. In a measure they were successful, but it is understood that a few sections were obtained by outsiders. The fact that the purchases were being made did not become public until today.

The effort to drain the swamp is largely an experiment, but if it succeeds the land will be worth \$10 or more per acre. State Treasurer Moore, who resided for many years in the Klamath lake country, says that the drainage of the tule swamp has always been a subject of great interest in that section of the state but no one has had much confidence in an undertaking of that kind.

Recently a steath dredger has been working on a ditch on Lower Klamath and after inspecting the work of the dredger he is of the opinion that the people who have bought this 11,000-acre tract may be able to drain the swamp.

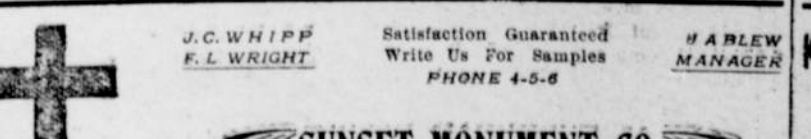
