The supply of sponges has never equaled the demand, and we have been importing most of those required for the domestic trade. According to the enthusitic trade. Successful experiments have been conducted, and the actual work of planting sponges off the coast of Florida is being done under the supervision of Captain James A. Smith, of the Fishhawk.
