A RIVER OF INK.

There exists in Algeria a small stream which nature has turned into ink. It is formed by the union of two rivulets, one of which is very strongly impregnated with iron, while the other, meandering through a peat marsh, imbibes large quantities of gallic acid. WATSON AND SNIDER.
