**CAN MAKE PROOF.**  
Expectation to Sell for Profit After  
Final Proof Not Unlawful.  
The following letter is in answer to a  
communication to the General Land  
Office from Chas. W. Strothers, a young  
attorney of Yreka, who concluded to  
ascertain beyond question his status be-  
fore making final proof on a claim on  
which he had filed.

He stated plainly that he had no in-  
tention of living on the land or indivi-  
dually making any personal use of the  
timber thereon, but that the entry was  
made by him for his own use and ben-  
efit, in the sense that he intended to hold  
the same until he could sell to advan-  
tage in the future.  
He stated that he desired to know  
whether there was a prospect of his pa-  
tent being held up by the department  
and his money forfeited in case he  
should proceed to prove up. The reply  
should effectually dispel all doubts  
concerning the rights of individuals in the  
premises:

"Washington, D. C.—Mr. Charles W.  
Strother, Lawyer, Yreka—Dear Sir: Re-  
ferring to your letter of 29th ult., re-  
lative to the suspension of your timber  
and stone entry, you are advised that if  
you made a satisfactory showing that  
your entry was made for your own use  
and benefit and there is nothing more to  
impede your good faith than the mere  
fact that you made the entry for invest-  
ment with intent to sell the land at  
some future indefinite time and in this  
manner realize a profit on the money in-  
vested, this office holds that such an en-  
try is not made in violation of law and  
should be passed to patent.

**NORMAL SCHOOL NOTES.**  
**NORMAL SCHOOL, ASHLAND, OR.,**  
October 21, 1903.  
The increase of students has been  
gradual from the opening of the school  
this fall in September until the total up  
to last Friday had reached 205 in all de-  
partments with still quite a number of  
old students of last year to enter. The  
new building is yet incomplete and on  
account of the scarcity of skilled labor  
it will not in all probability be ready  
for use for a month or more, a fact  
which greatly inconveniences the classes  
in the Normal as the old building does  
not furnish ample room for the work  
being done this year. However slow  
people might have been in recognizing  
the value and position of the Normal,  
it is and ought to be the leading school  
in Southern Oregon and the increase of  
students have demanded better and  
more extensive buildings and as a re-  
sult there has been built this year the  
new academic building and gymnasium,  
both of which will be ready in the near  
future. The Normal is doing not only  
professional work, preparing the young  
to teach, but with its corps of instru-  
ctors is giving such work as will permit  
students to enter our colleges and uni-  
versities.  
The students have formed two literary  
societies, one for the young women and  
one for the young men. The young  
men's society will do work principally  
in debating and public speaking and  
the young ladies that of literary and  
eloquent work.  
The Normal football squad is practi-  
cing daily, preparing for the games to be  
played between the Normal and several  
high schools of Southern Oregon. The  
first game of the season is to be played  
at Ashland on Saturday, October 31  
with the Medford high school.
