THE KLAMATH PARISH.

Treasurer Moore Says Government Should Protect Indians in the Lands Allotted to Them.

When asked what he thought should be done to solve the problem of the marsh lands on the Klamath reservation State Treasurer Moore said:

"There seems to be no doubt as to the state's right to the land under the swamp land grant of 1860. Subsequent to that time the government made a treaty with the Indians by which they gave up all their lands except the Klamath reservation, and this the government agreed to protect them in. As a matter of law I presume that the treaty did not convey the swamp lands to the Indians but the poor, ignorant red men knew nothing of that and supposed that they were getting all the land inside the borders of the reserve. Whatever may be the legal status of the matter I think it is clear that the government is under legal obligations to protect the Indians in the lands that have been allotted to them. It has been stated that 430 allotments have been made on the marsh. Assuming that these figures are correct about 50,000 acres of the marsh has been allotted to the Indians. To take this away from them and give them land elsewhere would be to put them upon poor lands which none of the other Indians wanted and would deprive them of an equal chance in the distribution of the lands. There are timber lands on the reservation that are more valuable than the swamp lands, but they are not productive of revenue at present. What the Indians want and must have, or become paupers, is land that they can use or rent, and this they can do with the swamp lands that have been allotted to them.

"I believe that a just and equitable solution of the difficulty would be for the government to reimburse the state for the swamp lands that have already been allotted and give the state the remainder, reimbursing the Indians for what they have lost. Assuming that 50,000 acres of the swamp has been allotted the government could pay the state \$1 per acre for this land and let the Indians keep it. Then the Indians could be paid \$1 per acre for the lands they do not get, and the state would have this land to sell. Under this kind of a settlement it would be necessary to have an agreement with the Indians that they shall not stand in the way of any attempt of the state or its grantees to drain the swamp land which it may secure. If this kind of a settlement could be made the state would get approximately \$100,000 for its land, which is the regular price for swamp land. The Indians would get all that has been allotted to them and the government would be fulfilling its moral obligations to both the state and the Indians.

Prof. F. G. Young has been appointed as the educational exhibit Commissioner for Oregon, and Supt. H. S. Lyman as superintendent, and these gentlemen have, in conjunction with the committee appointed for this purpose by the State Teachers' Association, prepared a circular containing suggestions and plans for preparing a creditable exhibition, which you will receive in due time.
