VOICE OF THE PEOPLE

Mr. Editor.—In a recent issue of the
Express appeared an article headed
"Pulpit, Press—Now the People."
The article was interesting reading to
the general public; such articles always
are. The discussion it provoked together
with the subsequent action of the
authorities in consequence thereof will
in the end result in a great deal of good
to this community.

The following taken from the article,
is particularly pertinent, for several
reasons and I therefore quote it: "If
a community made up of a people of
enlightenment, such as this city of
Klamath Falls, certainly is, will allow
this flagrant disregard of the prop-
erties, it surely bespeaks a weak spot
somewhere. There are very few towns
in which the "necessary evil" as such
institutions are appropriately or inap-
propriately spoken of do not exist. But
seldom indeed is this "evil" allowed to
ensconce itself in the heart of the com-
munity."

That we have had agitation of this
subject from the pulpit and the people
within the last year and a half, or two
years is certainly true, but agitation by
the press during that period is not
within the memory of the writer. That
part of the caption or heading, "now
the people," to one familiar with the in-
side facts—and by the way there are a
number of such—furnishes food for re-
flection; and despite the seriousness of
the matter, provokes a smile, as the
history of this "necessary evil" in our
community comes up for review.

This "now the people" agitation will
certainly discover as it drags its weary
length along, that a considerable
sprinkling of this community vividly
recall the circumstances under which
this so called "necessary evil" was en-
abled to gain a permanent foothold and
to ensconce itself in the immediate prox-
imity of several very respectable fam-
ilies of this community, where it was
permitted to remain unmolested by this
"now the people," an eyesore and a
menace to the peace and moral welfare
of those families; compelled, as they
are from their very doorsteps and fire-
sides to witness and listen to the night-
ly and daily bawdry of this same out-
fit.

Where was this same "Now the People"
contingent when the families and citi-
zens of this afflicted residence district
appeared before the town board impor-
tuning that body to take some steps
towards eradicating the then "necessary
evil" or at least obliging them to remove
from their vicinity? What was the re-
sult of their efforts before the town
board? They were politely but firmly
informed that nothing could be done,
that it was a necessary evil and existed
in every community aspiring to a place
in the van-guard of progress; that they
must bear their burden meekly as be-
comes good citizens and now run home
and don't bother the board any more,
or words to that effect.

Not content to do so however, they
applied to the district attorney, or
rather to his then deputy, for relief and
he promptly prepared and swore to a
complaint charging those people with
keeping a bawdy house, but was as
promptly refused a warrant for their
arrest by the town recorder.

So the matter rested and the evil re-
mained snugly and securely ensconced
in the midst of those families until it
voluntarily abandoned that location for
its present abode some six weeks ago.

My, what a howl, then rent the air
when this "now the people" contingent
realized that this evil had established
its abode between Houston's and Wil-
son's saloons on main street—had ac-
tually dared to sit itself down on the
same street with them. Lo and behold,
it is no longer a "necessary evil" but
a menace to the moral atmosphere of
that particular locality, and last but
not least, a menace to the revenue of
those institutions. It makes a deal of
difference whose ox is being gored, even
in a moral proposition.

The fountain head of the present agita-
tion of this matter, so far as the people
are concerned, is the same that pre-
vented the former sufferers from the
then "necessary evil" from obtaining
relief; that shook its head at the re-
corder when that worthy was applied
to for a warrant.

If the present agitation of this mat-
ter is barren of results, the failure can be
directly attributable to the fact that a
majority of citizens of this community
regard it not solely in the interest of
good morals but as a protection to the
revenues of the two saloons whose
sacredness has been trespassed upon by
this "evil." True, the saloons are deep
in the background, but a canvass of the
town reveals the fact that the real situa-
tion is thoroughly understood, and the
general opinion seems to be that if we
are to have this "evil" for the time be-
ing, not denominated as "necessary" in
our midst, let it be, not in the resi-
dence district, but as it is, between its
kindred evils, directly on the beat of
the town marshal, and under his all-
seeing eye.
