KLAMATH'S TAXES.
The state Board consisting of the governor, secretary of state and state treasurer have computed the revenue to be raised by direct taxes for state expenses for 1904 and fixed the amount at \$1,225,000. The apportionment for Klamath, Lake and Crook counties is as follows:
Klamath, \$14,087.50 or .0115 per cent of the entire tax.
Lake, \$13,107.50 or .0107 per cent of the entire tax.
Crook \$15,925.00 or .0130 per cent of entire tax.

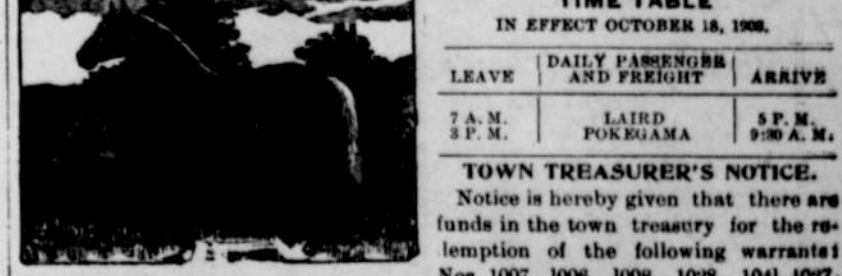
