The proposition offered by the incorporators of the new ditch is the most fair and favorable one ever made and we have failed as yet to learn of any objection to it. All those whose land will be affected should realize the necessity of their calling on Mr. Brown at once and rendering him all the assistance possible in getting the required acreage signed, as that is the only thing necessary to insure the ditch being built.

The unusually excellent crops in Klamath county together with the bright prospects of a railroad have given an impetus to the demand for real estate in this section and prices have shown a steady increase. During the past year Klamath Falls and vicinity have experienced a building boom far exceeding anything in the past and the outlook for next year already shows signs of surpassing the one just closed. Klamath county has just begun to advance and her prosperity is of a permanent kind which is bound to steadily increase during the coming year.

Why Ride in a Stage Coach When We Can Have a Railroad?

Only 20 miles actual stage ride now between Klamath Falls and the railroad. What a marvelous change, it seems almost incredible to persons living abroad, who have been accustomed for the past 15 or 16 years to dread the daily stage ride over mountain roads, a most impossible six months of the year on account of mud or snow, and the other six months to be suffocated with dust. This shortening of the heretofore unenviable torture is certainly encouraging to the inhabitants of our beautiful Klamath land.

Having occasion to make a trip over this route recently, I was instructed to be on hand at the Klamath Lake Navigation Co's wharf, at 5 o'clock a. m. Promptly to a minute at that hour, in company with several other passengers, I stepped aboard their elegant launch and, the lines being cast off, we started down the beautiful Lake Klamath. After a delightful ride of 130 minutes we found ourselves at the Keno Hotel, now under the capable management of L. O. Mills and his excellent wife, where our officious were greeted with the grateful aroma of coffee and broiling steak, to which, by reason of the stimulus imparted to us, already kept appetites, we did ample justice.

I then climbed into the implement of torture called a "stage coach" and in a trifle less than five hours reached Pokenama, where I once more discussed a bounteous repast, spread before me by Miss Katie Jacobs, and bidding adieu to all anxiety, as to whether or not the wagon would turn "turtle", break down, or the wheel horse elect the dash board, or the entire team run away, continued my journey in a real railroad car, via the Klamath Lake R. R., fully convinced by my day's experience, that the glorious dawn of a brighter day and better civilization is at last extending its light to our long isolated portion of this great commonwealth.

Another thought in this connection came to me, viz: Why make this 20 mile stage ride? The Klamath Lake railroad is a visible established fact as far as Pokenama, its engineering difficulties are all solved. All we need to do is to extend it to our county seat, from which point freight can be distributed by boat to the Merrill country on the south and Fort Klamath and Wood River valley on the north; our cattle, hogs, sheep, wool, and horses shipped to the markets of the world in a few hours, instead of requiring many days travel through mud and storm to reach a railroad; innumerable new industries be inaugurated and millions of dollars in value added to our fertile lands and vast pine forests. It is up to us people now to decide. What shall the answer be?

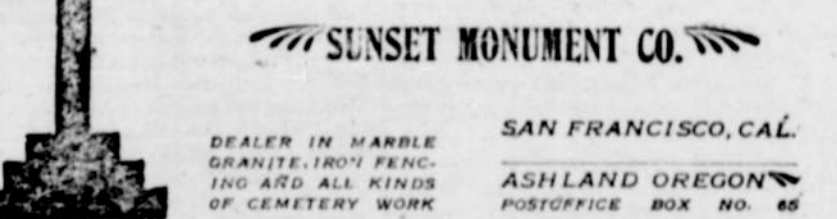
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
