WILL EFFECT THE WEST.

**Largest Feeding Grounds in the
World for Cattle to Be Estab-
lished in the South.**

The news of the purchase by Swifts,
the Armour, Nelson Morris and
Schwartzchild & Sulzberger, of 1,000-
000 acres of land in Southern Ala-
bama and Northern Florida has
caused considerable excitement among
the cattlemen, stock yards and the
railways.

These interests see behind the pur-
chase a move intended to revolution-
ize the meat industry of America.

The great tract, it is declared, was
purchased from the Louisville &
Nashville railway at an average price
of \$3.75 an acre, making the total
money consideration \$3,750,000.

It is declared that the great Chicago
packers intend to establish, on the
reclaimed swamp land and the pine
lands of Georgia and Florida, the
greatest cattle-feeding ground in the
world, and to escape from rates and
double hauls, "the local" rates be-
tween Montana and Chicago and Chi-
cago and New York, in short, to rid
themselves of the great expense of
shipping, and to fatten cattle on
cassava.

It is said, before the purchase was
consummated, an agreement was
reached by the agents of the packers
with the Alabama Agricultural Com-
mission in regard to lands which were
held by the Louisville & Nashville
railway on government grants. The
industrial commission, it is said, saw
in the move the opening of a new era
for the south—the acquisition of a
great part of the huge cattleraising
industry of the west.

The secret of the whole deal lies in
one word—cassava. The word cas-
sava in connection with the deal has
startled the Lassel-street men and
shocked the corn-products trust.
Cassava is a shrubby plant. It has a
flesh root which produces edible
starch. It is also called manioc.

It was upon this plant that the
deal hinged, and it is upon this plant,
the authorities declare, that the
future of the South now rests. The
plant has been found to flourish in
the region of Southern Alabama. It
is declared to be the greatest fatten-
ing agent for cattle yet discovered.

The Chicago packers have agreed
with the Alabama Agricultural Com-
mission, it is asserted, to plant the
1,000,000 acres in cassava, and to feed
cattle on it.

The corn-products trust is interest-
ed, because it is said the packers in-
tend, in connection with their feed-
ing ground, to establish great starch
factories, and to manufacture starch
and other products of the cassava root
and put them in the field in competi-
tion with the corn products of the
trust.
