LOOKS LIKE BUSINESS.

**Ditch Flee Not Ready to Make Any
 Promises But They Act as if They
 Intended Building Ditch.**

Mr. Brown and Mr. Hawkins have
 been busy since the first of the week
 making a survey and estimating the
 cost of a tunnel through the big hill
 near the upper lake. Mr. Brown, the
 surveyor, says that he considers a
 tunnel through the hill, much cheap-
 er than a canal and that they will
 experiment in boring to ascertain the
 nature of the formation, and the cost
 of construction.

Mr. Hawkins arrived from Califor-
 nia Sunday evening, and when asked
 if he had decided to build the canal,
 replied that he did not wish to make
 any statement for the public at
 present, but from the expense they are
 going to, it can be inferred that they in-
 tend to build the ditch.

The new contracts are being print-
 ed and will be ready Monday, and we
 have every reason to believe that
 actual work will commence in the
 near future.

DEATH OF A PIONEER.

Joseph Arthur Bowdoin died at his
 home in this city Sunday, February
 14, 1904, aged 73 years, 9 months and
 12 days.

Deceased was an old pioneer of this
 county, and was a most honorable,
 upright christian gentleman, with a
 host of friends throughout the coun-
 try. He was born in Alabama, May
 2, 1830 and crossed the plains to Cal-
 ifornia in 1852. Here he remained,
 engaged in the practice of dentistry
 until the spring of 1884, when he re-
 moved to Linkville (now Klamath
 Falls) and on May 10 established the
 first newspaper in this county, the
 Klamath County Star. This he con-
 tinued to publish until 1889.

Mr. Bowdoin was married in the
 early 60's to Miss Rebecca Shortridge
 of Plumas county, California. The
 issue of this marriage was five chil-
 dren, three of whom are living; Mrs.
 Florence E. Green, Vancouver, Wash.,
 Mrs. Ada J. Herron, Portland, Or.,
 and W. E. Bowdoin, foreman of the
 Klamath Falls Express of this city.

About five years ago Mr. Bowdoin
 moved to Portland where he resided
 with his daughter, but returned here
 last fall. His health has been poor
 for some time, mainly due to his age.
 Funeral services were held at the
 Methodist church at 2 o'clock Mon-
 day afternoon. Interment was made
 in the Klamath Falls cemetery be-
 side the remains of his wife, who
 died in 1889.

IN PORTLAND, APRIL 14.

Republicans will hold their next
 state convention at Portland Thurs-
 day, April 14.
 Each county will be represented by
 one delegate-at-large, one for every
 150 votes cast for Judge Bean in the
 last general election and one for every
 fraction of 150 larger than 100. Klam-
 ath and Lake counties will each have
 four delegates.

The total number of delegates will
 be 361. In 1902 the total was 343
 and in 1900 336, on the same basis of
 apportionment. The State Commit-
 tee recommends to County Commit-
 tees April 2 for primaries and April 7
 for conventions. Conventions of the
 two Congressional Districts are usu-
 ally held the day before the State
 convention.

MARK HANNA DEAD.

Senator M. A. Hanna, after hover-
 ing between life and death for several
 days, died at Washington D. C. at
 6:40 P. M., Washington time, Mon-
 day Feb. 15.

Marcus Alonzo Hanna was born
 September 24, 1837; elected United
 States Senator from Ohio, 1897; re-
 elected, 1904; employer; partner in
 wholesale grocery house in early life,
 later head of coal mining firm and
 other large firms; directed campaign
 which secured the election of William
 McKinley; present chairman National
 Republican Committee.

HAYS DIPLOMATIC TRIUMPH.

Washington, Feb. 13.—Secretary
 Hay has added another to his long
 list of diplomatic triumphs and the
 United States is once more enabled by
 his diplomacy to head the nations in
 a concurrent effort to preserve the in-
 tegrity of China. Hay's note of Feb-
 ruary 10 to Russia and Japan urging
 them to confine the hostilities within
 as small an area as possible and to re-
 spect the neutrality and administra-
 tive entity of China, will be accepted
 by Russia as well as Japan and all na-
 tions will join the Washington govern-
 ment in inviting the combatants to
 agree to the proposition.
