**DEMOCRATS IN SESSION.**

**Nominating County Ticket—Swallow White Bryan and Hearst—Hosi Against Trusts, Frauds, Corruptions and Villanies—Endorse Hearst for President.**  
The Democratic County Convention met at 10 o'clock today and organized and appointed committees. At the afternoon session at two o'clock, the committee on credentials read their report, which was approved after which Alex Martin and George Odell were elected permanent chairman and secretary of the convention.  
The committee on order of business then reported and the following resolutions were offered and adopted:  
Mr. Chairman—We your committee on resolutions representing the Democrats of Klamath county, in convention assembled beg leave to make the following report:  
Whereas, the American people are about to enter upon another presidential campaign, it is proper that the democrats of Klamath county should declare their purposes and principles therefore be it  
Resolved, that we reaffirm the principles of democracy as enumerated by Jefferson, Jackson and William Jennings Bryan.  
Resolved, that we regard the existence of the predatory trust and their prosecution by the present republican administration as a constant menace to the well being of the people.  
Resolved, that the people demand the reduction of the present trust breeding and sustaining tariff to a revenue basis, to the end that the people shall be free from the exactions of trust made piece.  
Resolved, that we especially denounce the beef trust as a positive injury to the well being of the stock growing interests of the west.  
Resolved, that the maintenance, inviolate, of the doctrines of the Declaration of Independence, as imperatively necessary to the permanence of democratic government, and that the continued control of the Philippines, without the consent of the principals of free government.  
Resolved, that we denounce the failure of the present administration to enforce the criminal clause, of the anti-trust clause, and demand its enforcement. The sending to prison of a few of the trust magnates under that law would be an object lesson of more value than any other process.  
Resolved, that we heartily endorse and approve the action of William R. Hearst in the prosecution of the coal trust, and commend him to the favorable consideration of the democratic National convention as a presidential nominee.  
Resolved, that the recent development of FRAUD, CORRUPTION and VILLANIES in the postal and land departments, indicates a vital necessity for a change of party control of National affairs, and we denounce the present administration as fraught with demoralization and dishonest practices which demand its removal. Everything went smooth up to this time and there looked as if there would be no tellers but two names were placed in nomination for treasurer. R. I. Hammond and Claude Daggett. Mr. Hammond received the majority of votes and was declared elected.  
Assessor—J. P. Lee received 22 votes and Tom Odell 11. Mr. Lee was declared nominated.  
School Superintendent—Chas. Fox of Lorella by acclamation.  
By this time the democrats had run out of good material as someone nominated W. B. Simpson for surveyor. This was objected to by Mr. Emery of the Fort delegation, who declared he would not support a Republican when he ran on a democratic ticket. His name was withdrawn and Frank Adams was nominated by acclamation.  
For coroner—Dr. H. B. Hargus by acclamation.  
For County Central Committee: J. L. Hanks, Alex Martin and J. F. Goeller by acclamation.  
Mr. Goeller thought not a delegate nor holding any proxy as far as we could learn, took part in the convention and placed George Chastain in nomination for clerk and Fred Melhase for commissioner.
