PROMINENT VISITORS.

Well Known Railroad Officials are Entertained in Klamath Falls—They Also Enjoy an Excursion on the Big Klamath Lake.

Mr. Hervey Lindley, president of the Klamath Lake railroad, accompanied by Mr. Samuel Hill, son-in-law of James J. Hill, the railroad magnate, and Mr. Charles Chamberlain, western manager of the Great Northern railroad, with headquarters at Seattle, arrived in Klamath Falls Monday evening on a tour of inspection. Tuesday the party made an excursion trip by boat on the upper lake; upon their return the same evening they, in company with Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Travis, of Portland, dined at the Ewauna Club, leaving immediately afterward for Keno by private conveyance, Mr. Hill's return to New York having been urged by telegraph during his stay here.

The gentlemen all expressed themselves as being delighted with their reception and entertainment while among us and regretted their inability, to, at this time, prolong their stay. Both Mr. Hill and Mr. Chamberlain are very much interested in this particular section of our country. Mr. Chamberlain especially, who is a man of extended experience and broad ideas, expressed himself as being most favorably impressed by his observations during this brief visit. Mr. Lindley is entitled to the sincerest thanks of this entire community for his success in bringing men of such railroad prominence among us.

EXPRESS AND MAILS BURNED. The combination car used by the Klamath Lake R. R. Company caught fire Sunday morning, while on the road between Thrall and Pokegama. When near the switch-back smoke was discovered in one end of the car and on removing some of the mail sacks, the entire end of the car was discovered to be on fire. The train was stopped as soon as possible and the contents of the car removed but not before considerable damage was done to the freight, express matter and mail. A quantity of goods that was on board for some of our merchants was completely destroyed and several mail sacks burned and their contents badly scorched. The railroad company have assumed all the damages and have already settled with most of the losers. Quite a number of passengers were aboard, among them some ladies, who were badly scared.
