lumber here, he purchased a mill and

fully engaged. Mr. Rhoads has al-

but has never asked for an office at  
their hands. He received the nomi-  
nation for county clerk on the earnest  
solicitation of his neighbors and  
friends of Tule Lake precinct, which  
met with instant favor throughout
