STOCKMEN FRIENDLY.

Mr. I. D. Applegate, one of the heavy
sheep owners of this county, who was in
the city last week, when asked if there
was likely to be any difficulty between
the cattle and sheep men in this sec-
tion, said that the feeling between the
two parties was very harmonious. He
expressed himself as very much pleased
at the fair treatment which the cattle-
men were disposed to give them. In
the northern part of Modoc county
where he had fed the past winter, the
cattlemen proposed that they divide the
range, one party taking everything west
and the other everything east of the
road. This proposition is considered
very satisfactory and was accepted. Mr.
Applegate says that there was over 11-
000 sheep fed in the lava beds last win-
ter, which with the increase of 5000
makes nearly 16,000 there now. This is
all that the range will stand and unless
some outside sheep man comes in and
encroaches on the other range, there
will be no reason for any trouble be-
tween the two parties.
