One of the most interesting and gratifying features of the campaign just closed has been the admirable work of State Chairman Frank C. Baker. He has correctly apprehended the true issue as the endorsement of President Roosevelt, and has especially bent his energies to harmonizing the party with excellent effect. Through his personal letters to voters, he has induced Republicans otherwise disaffected to get into line for the Republican ticket, especially Legislative nominees. Mr. Baker's original appointment was made without his solicitation, but his signal success abundantly justifies the confidence of those who recommended his selection. MISS MCCARTY GETS \$10,000.

Her Good Name More Damaged by the Trial Than Her Affections by Heryford—She Will Accept the Verdict.

Miss Birdie McCarty has traded her reputation for \$10,000 of James D. Heryford's money. After 15 minutes' deliberation yesterday afternoon the jury which has for three days listened to the famous breach of promise case brought in a verdict for \$10,000 in favor of the Wisconsin schoolma'am who sued the wealthy Lakeview cattleman for \$70,000 damages. Miss McCarty certainly earned the money. Through two long trials she has sat and heard herself called all the names that may be cast at an unscrupulous or wanton woman. Twice she has sat in the witness chair and confessed to the voluntary surrender of her virtue, while the man denied that she had ever fallen from the straight and narrow path.

This was the second trial of the case, the first, which resulted in a verdict of \$22,000, having been set aside by Judge Bellinger on the ground that the amount awarded was excessive.

Under the instructions given by the court to the jury yesterday afternoon about the only question to be decided by the jury was the amount of damages. "The plaintiff is entitled to something," said Judge Bellinger to the 12 men who faced him. Upon the defendant's request the court instructed the jury that Heryford's subsequent offer of marriage might be considered as a mitigating circumstance. The verdict is regarded as satisfactory by Miss McCarty and her attorneys, and in view of the

REPUBLICAN VICTORY.

Klamath County Gives Republican Plurality 124. Democrats Get Three County Offices.

Klamath county went republican by 124, that being the plurality of Frank A. Moore, the republican nominee for justice of the supreme court. Binger Hermann's popularity is shown by a majority over Veatch of 221 and a plurality of 162. Judges Benson and Hanna ran away ahead of their ticket. The former received a majority over Dufar of 427 and Hanna over Neil of 228. W. J. Moore wins over Brattain by 137 and Laycock over Booth by 104. Griffith leads Shook by 110 but Shook has carried Lake and his vote in Crook and Grant will probably result in his election. Steiner wins by 137 over Taylor and also carries Lake county. In the county vote for the principal offices was very close. Chastain, D., for clerk wins by 13 votes. Obenchain, R., for sheriff by 41; Lewis, R., for treasurer by 69; Lee, D., for assessor by 82; Mellase, D., for commissioner by 34; Wight, R., for school superintendent by 216 and Merryman for coroner by 86. There was no opposition to Henry, R., for surveyor and he received over 800 votes.

BRATTAIN DEFEATED.

Hon. E. M. Brattain of Lakeview, was defeated for District Attorney by 81 votes. Lake County gave him a majority of 55 but he ran behind in Klamath 139 votes. This was due to his personal enemies here, as for instance Keno, an almost solid Republican precinct, which gave Laycock 25 majority, defeated Brattain by 27 majority. And in Linkville precinct it is estimated that he received fully one third of the democratic vote.

The salary of the Klamath Falls postmaster has been increased from \$1100 to \$1300.
