DAIRY ITEMS.

There was quite a stir in Dairy yesterday, election day. The sage brush seemed to shill out voters, and quite a heavy poll was cast, 82 in all. Nine were sworn in, there being that many more than were registered. The republicans as usual for Dairy had a good majority. The vote on local option stood 16 in favor and 60 against. On the district primary law, 19 in favor and 33 against. The Socialists were well pleased with the result of the election and intent to organize more thoroughly and do more educational work.

Last Friday evening Prof. Francis gave an interesting lecture on the "Money Question." He showed that money was subject to the law of supply and demand, therefore of shifting value. He adhered to the statement that "the quantity of circulating medium regulated prices," and then showed that it was to the interest of the bankers to contract the currency and of the producing classes to expand it. There are as long as those opposite interests exist there is no such thing as a permanent standard of value. Bryan's desire, that congress should regulate the monetary system, amounted to the same thing as the banking interests controlling the money, because the capitalists control congress. The professor stated that the only reliable way to estimate the cost of an article was to consider the number of days labor it took to produce it. By days labor was a natural and equitable way of estimating value.

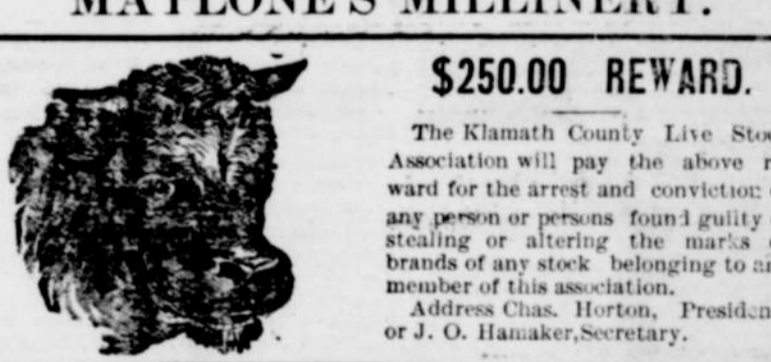
