games has been very good as we have

Houston as sureties.

S. C. Graves, Justice of the Peace,
Linkville precinct, \$1,000 with F. M.
Barnum and J. L. Hanks as sureties.

The bond of Silas Obenchain for tax
collector for \$10,000 with the U. S. Fi-
delity and Guaranty Co. as surety was
rejected on account of a certain clause
in the bond which was objectionable to
the Board. P. L. Fountain will serve
as tax collector under the bond of ex-
-Sheriff Summers until a new bond is
furnished.

The bond of the county clerk was
lowered from \$15,000 to \$10,000.

The bond of the treasurer was raised
from \$30,000 to \$30,000. Treasurer
Lewis will not go into office until he
furnishes another bond as the one offer-
ed contained the same clause as in Mr.
Obenchain's bond, which was rejected.

THE CELEBRATION.

Largest Crowd in Years Celebrate the
Fourth at Klamath Falls.

The glorious Fourth was duly celebra-
-ted in Klamath Falls. The crowning of
the Goddess of Liberty and the Oration
by Hon. H. L. Benson were the main
features of the forenoon. The carriage
containing Miss Lola Nelson, the god-
-dess of liberty, and her four maids of
honor, the Misses McDonald, Emmitt,
Burris and Houston, drew up at the
Court House grounds at about 10:30.
They were met by R. St. Geo. Bishop,
Sec'y. of the Agricultural Assn. and
Judge Geo. T. Baldwin and duly escort-
-ed to their places on the stage erected
for that purpose. Alex Martin Jr. was
master of ceremonies and introduced
Judge Baldwin who performed the cere-
-mony, crowning the Goddess of Liberty.
After a selection by the band and the
rendering of "My Country" Hon. H. L.
Benson was introduced as the orator of
the day. Judge Benson is well known
as a fluent and interesting speaker but
it was remarked by everyone present
that this was the best effort of his
career. The spacious Court House
grounds were packed with humanity,
even to the fences and sidewalk and all
listened appreciatively to every word of
Klamath County's idol. That "Our
Judge" is popular with the people was
a self evident fact. The program for
the morning concluded with the singing
of "Hail Columbia."

Over 500 people witnessed the races
in the afternoon at the agricultural
park. There was a great deal of jockey-
-ing done and considerable time wasted
in starting but as they were all local
horses and each horse had its group of
-admirers, the interest was kept up until
the last. Arant's Shirley V carried off
every race.

In the evening a large barge was tow-
-ed out into the lake in front of the town
and the fireworks given from there.
The display could be easily seen from
all over the city and was thoroughly
enjoyed by all.

This was the conclusion of the official
program and a great majority of the
merrymakers then took in the big dance
at the Opera House.
