MAKING STREETS.

**Work with the New Rock Crusher
and Street Making Plant Com-
menced Tuesday.**

The big rock crusher is now turn-
ing out twelve tons of crushed rock
per hour. Work was commenced
Tuesday morning. E. B. Henry is
the superintendent of the work, and
Engineer Clyde Nickerson has charge
of the machinery. Besides these they
have a crew of twenty-two men and
six teams at work. This crew will
probably have to be increased if the
crusher is run full time. The plant
is now located at the intersection of
Pine and Second streets, and they are
at present just using the loose rocks
on the property in that vicinity. The
product is being hauled and placed on
the street at the west end of town.
The rock is only being graded in two
sizes; the coarser for filling and grad-
ing, and the fine rock for the top
dressing. As soon as this piece of
street is finished, work will be com-
menced in building the approach to
the city at the east end of Main
street. The work between the bridge
and the East End will be done by
contract.

pardoned Roger Williams, a Klamath
Agency Indian, who was sentenced to
serve three years in the penitentiary
for larceny, and who had served about
one half of the time. Williams is go-
ing blind from tuberculosis of the eye,
and this together with affidavits that
had been filed tending to show doubt
of his guilt, was the cause of the par-
don. Williams was convicted in the
circuit court of Klamath county of
having stolen a steer.

**DEATH OF
JUDGE SMITH.**
Telegram Received Announcing the
Death of Judge George W. Smith
at San Diego, on August 22, at
11:30 a. m.

Alex. Martin, Jr., received a tele-
gram from San Diego, Calif. Monday,
announcing the death at 11:30 that
morning of Judge Geo. W. Smith, of
heart disease. The deceased has been
under the doctor's care for several
years, and the end was not unexpect-
ed. His wife was the only member
of his family present at the time of
his death, although his son George,
who lives at Eugene, Ore., arrived
shortly afterward, and will have
charge of the arrangements for the
funeral. The body will probably be
shipped to Klamath Falls for interment.

George Washington Smith was
born in Louisville, Ky., July 7, 1839,
and later moved with his parents to
Washington county, Mo., where he
attended the public schools and later
worked at the blacksmith trade
with his father; eventually they
embarked in the saw-milling busi-
ness. June 20, 1859, he married
Margaret Delmar, who was born
in North Carolina, from where she
removed with her parents to Missouri
as a child. Two years after this mar-
riage, the father of Mr. Smith was
killed in the Washington county saw-
mill and the son succeeded to both
the management and ownership of
the business. Owing to the depres-
sion in trade incident to the civil war
he sold the mill in 1861 and in Octo-
ber, 1862, left Missouri for New York
City, where he embarked for Califor-
nia by way of the Isthmus of Pan-
ama.

Arriving in San Francisco at the age
of 24, and with \$15 comprising his
worldly possessions, he went to Vir-
ginia City and completed his trade,
following the same after his removal
to Santa Clara county in 1865. Pre-
vious to 1879 he combined general
farming and working in a shop on his
land, and in that year removed to
Siskiyou county, where for five years
he was president and superintendent
of the Scott River Ditch and Mining
Company.

In 1883 he sold his interest and
moved to Klamath county, purchased
the Linkville Hotel, remodeled and
refurnished the same, and placed it
on a paying basis. In 1885 he pur-
chased 760 acres of land three miles
east of Klamath Falls, combining the
management of this property with
his hotel, and adding yet another re-
sponsibility in 1886 in the shape of a
general merchandise store. The only
one of this trio of interests to escape
the conflagration of 1889 was the farm,
which owed its immunity from de-
struction to its remoteness from the
burning town. The hotel and store
were rebuilt, but in 1892 two years
after its completion the hotel was
reduced to ashes. The merchandise
business was disposed of in 1901, and
in June 1902, he removed with his
wife to Phoenix, Arizona, near which
place he purchased 220 acres of land
in the Salt River valley. He spent
several months of last year in Klamath
Falls and this summer he was com-
pelled to leave Arizona on account of
the heat and has been in San Diego
some time under the care of a promi-
nent physician.

A Democrat during his entire vol-
untary life, Judge Smith gained his
official title in 1884, when he was
elected judge of Klamath county,
serving four years. Again he sat on
the bench from 1890 to 1892, filling an unex-
pired term. In keeping with his sub-
stantiality and influence in the com-
munity is his association with the
foremost fraternal organizations of
the west. He was a member of the
Blue Lodge No. 77, A. T. & A. M. of

Klamath Falls; of Mayfield Lodge,
No. 193, I.O.O.F. of Santa Clara
county, Cal., and Mount View Lodge,
A.O.U.W. of Santa Clara county,
Cal.
The deceased is survived by his
wife and seven out of their family of
eleven children: Mary Emily, wife of
W. C. Johnson, of Santa Cruz, Cal.;
Martha Frances, wife of Alex. Mar-
tin, Jr., of Klamath Falls, Ore.; W.
Walter, a merchant and rancher of
Bly, Ore.; George H. of Eugene;
Horatio E., who was until recently in
business at Merrill; Jennie, wife of
Frank Miner, of Phoenix, Ariz.; and
Richard S. Smith, a graduate of the
University of Oregon and of the
Columbia Law School, who is coach-
ing the Oregon University football
team this fall.
