KICKED BY HORSE.
A very serious accident occurred last evening about 8:30. R. C. Spink drove down from Yainax yesterday. Arriving here he took his team to Hazens stable and told the stableman, Fred Alexander, to be careful as his team was a little wild and might kick. He suggested that they unharness the horses outside but Fred thought it would be safe enough in the stall. He had unharnessed one horse and started to go into the stall again when the other horse kicked him, striking him with two feet, in the short ribs and breast bone. Dr. Merryman was summoned and upon examination found that no bones were broken. It is believed that there are internal injuries. The patient suffered a great deal during the night and this morning is still in a bad shape.

'LEM BRINER PASSES AWAY.
'Lem Briner, an old and respected Jackson county resident, died at the home of his son, Hugh Briner, in Portland, Friday night, and was buried in the Hargadine cemetery in Ashland, yesterday. The deceased, for many years a resident of Talent precinct, was a native of Indiana, where he was born in 1837. He was married in Iowa in 1861 and the same year came to the Pacific Coast to settle. Four sons survive him, James W., John W., Hugh and Phil, and two daughters, Mrs. Emmett Beeson of Talent and Mrs. Elmer Coleman of Phoenix. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Ronald McKillop, pastor of the First Baptist Church, at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon, and quite a concourse of relatives and friends of the deceased gathered to pay their last tribute of respect.—Ashland Tidings.

VERDICT FOR DEFENDANTS.
