STOCK ITEMS.

Frank Bloomingcamp and Wm.
Redding, of Bly, started 2500 head of
mutton sheep Saturday for Montague
for shipment to San Francisco.

which place they will be shipped to
the Oakland Meat Company to be
sold on commission.

M'CARTY CASE SETTLED.

The famous case of Miss Birdie Mc-
Carthy, the Michigan school teacher,
vs. James D. Heryford, the wealthy
Lakeview cattleman, has at last been
ended. Miss McCarthy, who is still in
Portland, has accepted the verdict of
Judge Bellingher that she receive
\$6000 for her wounded feelings, and
the money has been paid over, ac-
cording to Portland advices.

The case started more than a year
ago, when Miss McCarthy brought suit
for \$70,000 on grounds of breach of
promise. She secured a verdict for
\$22,500. This was immediately set
aside by Judge Bellingher. The bill
of complaint in the case was filed in
1902 and in 1903 a short time before
the trial an amended bill was filed
charging seduction as well as breach
of promise, and along these lines the
case was fought to a finish, ending
nearly two years from the time the
original bill of complaint was filed.

A BAD ACCIDENT.

Wm. Mesner of Pokegama, who
has been driving the stage for the
past three days in Bob Garrett's
place suffered quite a bad accident
about 4:30 yesterday afternoon that
will probably lay him up for several
weeks. Tom Newton was moving a
piano into C. C. Chitwood's and had
asked Mr. Mesner to assist him.
The piano was loaded on a light
spring wagon and as they were back-
ing up in front of Chitwood's, the
wheel struck a rock and overbalanced
the piano. Mesner who was standing
on the rear of the wagon, seeing that
the piano was going to fall, jumped,
but did not get out of the way in
time, as it fell on him, breaking his
right ankle, and badly bruising his
left leg. He had on heavy cruising
boots and but for this fact, his foot
and ankle would have been badly cut
by the sharp edge of the piano. He
was taken to one of the rooms in the
Willson building and was attended
by Dr. Hargus.

MOTHER OF MRS. E. R. REAMES.

Mrs. Elizabeth Hopwood Ross, a
native of Pennsylvania, delect of the
late General John E. Ross, and one
of the well known pioneer women of
this county whose life for more than
half a century was linked with the
history of the development of the
Rogue River valley, passed away at
her home in Central Point, last Fri-
day, after a lingering illness and in
the fullness of nearly three-fourths of
a century of years, not a few of which
were marked by the hardships and
trials which were the lot of those
early settlers of this section who
blazed the way and cleared the wild-
erness for the later comers.

General John E. Ross, who preced-
ed his life companion to the grave
more than fourteen years ago, was
one of the most conspicuous and dis-
tinguished of the Jackson county
pioneers, having been prominent as

an Indian fighter and in politics.
His marriage to Miss Elizabeth Hop-
wood, who has now followed him to
the grave, which occurred in Jack-
sonville in 1853, is said to have been the
first marriage celebrated in that his-
toric old town and was the occasion
naturally of great interest and at-
tention. The ceremony was performed
by a Methodist minister named Gil-
bert. Shortly afterward they located
on the donation land claim near Cen-
tral Point, in the very heart of the
Rogue River valley, which for many
years afterward was the family home.

The following are the surviving
children of the deceased: Mrs. Evan
R. Reames, Klamath Falls; Mrs. M.
L. Stahley, Ashland; Mrs. Rufus
Phelps, Paisley; Mrs. J. B. Cunn-
ingham, San Francisco; Mrs. A. R.
Davis, Mukogee; I. T. Messrs. Lewis
G., of Burns; Geo. B. John E. and
Thos. D., Central Point.

The funeral took place, Saturday,
interment in Jacksonville cemetery.
