Magnificent Display of Products
Now on Exhibition at the
Klamath County Promotion Club's Rooms,
in Carrick Building.

This year's crop of apples and fruit has been the largest and best ever known in Klamath County. And the display of apples grown in Klamath county which can be seen at the Promotion Club rooms, we believe can hardly be equaled anywhere in Oregon. Nearly all of the fruits and vegetables have been grown on dry land without irrigation. The largest exhibitors are O. A. Stearns, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Hamakar and N. S. Merrill. We are unable to give the entire list but some of the best exhibits are as follows:

By W. F. Arant—apples—Duchess of Oldenburg, Yellow Newton, and Rainbow.

By N. S. Merrill—Grimes Golden Pippin, King of Thorns, White Bellflowers, Waxen Winter Sweet, Green Pippins, Gloria Mundi and Northern Spy.

By Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Hamakar—20 ounce Pippins, Gloria Mundi, Dutch Mignon, and Siberian Crab.

(POTATOES)

By O. A. Stearns—Early Six Weeks, Rosetta, Early Rose, Mark Hanna, Good Times, Klamath Beauty, and improved Burbank. Mr. Stearns also had an exhibit of 38 potatoes which were grown in one hill, with a total weight of 22½ pounds.

Other exhibitors of potatoe were N. S. Merrill, O. Short, J. L. Padgett, and D. W. Anderson.

BEETS

Two beets weighing 23 pounds by J. L. Padgett. Sugar beets by E. S. Phillips, A. Turner, and Robert Casey. Early Turnip blood beet by J. W. Bryant. A 19 pound beet by Mike Rueck, and a 10 pound Strop beet turnip by Henry Janssen.

CABBAGE

A 21 pound cabbage by Shook Bros. and a 19 pound cabbage by Mike Rueck.

SQUASH.

There was some very excellent exhibits of wheat, barley, oats, rye, alfalfa, broom grass, pectinaria, and Billion Dollar grass. The exhibitors were: B. S. Grigsby, N. S. Merrill, A. D. Harpold, Robt. Casey, Frank Ross, H. H. Van Valkenburg and Geo. Pan Co. N. S. Merrill exhibited a bunch of Turkistan alfalfa, 5 ft 4 inches high which was sown in May 1904. A. D. Harpold showed some oats which yielded 125 bushels to the acre with one irrigation.

A NEW STEAMER

Is Being Built For the Upper Klamath Lake—Engines and Boilers Expected Today.

J. T. Totten and H. E. Hansberry, two well known and experienced Columbia River Steamboat men will build a large passenger and freight steamboat to be run on the upper Klamath Lake, which they expect to have completed by the middle of March. The steamer will be a three-decker, 108 feet long, 21 foot beam and 4½ foot hole. It will be built with a double cabin. The passenger cabins will seat 150 people and the boat will be able to carry about 75 tons of freight. The speed will be from 10 to 12 miles per hour.

The boiler is being brought from the railroad by Joe Moore and is expected here to day. It is a scotch marine boiler 5 by 12 and will pack 200 pounds of steam. Two 7 by 36 engines will be used. The boat will be equipped with four staterooms for the accommodation of the crew. The boat will be built at the head of Link River, above Moore's saw-mill. The construction work will commence about the first of the week and will be under the supervision of George W. Walker, one of the best ship-builders of Portland. The cost is estimated at over \$5,000.

Horton, and the good things of life which were on the table would have done justice to the appetite of a King. In the evening there was a grand serenade, which lasted until midnight. VIGILANT

HAVE SELECTED SITE.

The Roman Catholics Will Build Church and School in Klamath Falls—Have Also Secured a Site at Merrill.

Rev. C. J. O'Reilly, Roman Catholic Bishop of Baker City arrived in the city Saturday to join Father Hendricks who has been here some time making arrangements for the establishment of a school and church in Klamath county. Bishop O'Reilly addressed a very large audience of our prominent citizens at the Opera House on Sunday evening and spoke to the people of Merrill on Monday evening. He is a very earnest and broad minded man and made a lasting impression on his audience. Before leaving for the railroad Wednesday morning, he spoke very highly of the kind and courteous treatment he received from the people of Klamath Co. and also of their evident desire for the establishment of a church and school here. Block 5 in Fairview addition has been secured of Major Worden and Mrs. Sargent and the Bishop stated that they would probably commence building in the spring. After the establishment of a school and church, they may also add a hospital if circumstances will warrant it. N. S. Merrill has donated a block in the town of Merrill to the church there. Father Hendrich will remain in Klamath county for the present.

BIG RALLY AT FORT.
