An undertaking, which will equal the irrigation of our arid lands in its effect on the future prosperity and development of Klamath county, has been a last decided upon. Ever since they fin became interested in the county, Mr. (N. Hawkins and associates have been making investigations so as to interest capital in the establishment of a besugar factory here. Last spring an extensive analysis of the soil in Klamath Poe, Langell and Alkali valley's warmade and a quanity of sugar beet see was distributed among the farmers to be planted. The results in both these cases have been very satisfactory and both Mr. Hawkins and Mr. Brown ar convinced that sugar beets can be grow An undertaking, which will equal convinced that sugar beets can be grown here at a good profit. They have inter-ested other capital and intend building a factory in the Kiamath Basin, provi-ded that the farmers will guarantee to plant a sufficient acreage in sugar beets to warrant them in putting in the plant. Mr. Hawkins was asked if they would

build the factory at Klamath Falls or whether it would go to Merrill or some other point. He stated that it would be built in the Klamath valley but they had not decided where. As to building at Klamath Falls, he said, "It may be that the people do not want any factories here." When asked what the probable income per acre would be, if the land was planted in sugar beets, The land here will raise from 10 to 25 tons per acre, 125 tons would be a low average, and they will bring about four dollars a ton delivered at the banks of dollars a ton delivered at the banks of our canal." How will you ship the product of the factory to market if we have no railroad here? "That is a ratter which we will attend to. All we ask is that the farmers grow the beets and deliver them at our canal. We will do the rest. The proposition for the erection of a sugar beet factory in Klamath county is one that has been under consideration before, in fact, at one time it was reported that Spreckles, the sugar king, was negotiating for the purchase of the Carr, Hartery and other properties with this purpose in view; but since Jesse D. Carr's death nothing further was heard of the matter.

In 1903, there were 53 beet sugar factories in operation in the United States, with six more building with a capacity of 3100 tons of beets daily. Only a little over 22 per cent of the home consumption of sugar is supplied by domestic factories so it can be readily seen that the possibilities of this business are unlimited. With the chance of hay or grain in Klamath county it is evident that it is necessary to have diversified crops so that the farmers will not be compelled to depend on the results of one product. If this factory is established it will be a boon to our county. The beet sugar industry is practically in its infancy in the United States, but where factories have been established they have been the neucleus for large cities and in every instance.
