

HOW IS THIS FOR HIGH? A \$25,000 HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING FOR KLAMATH FALLS!

High School pupils are jubilant and the County Court has covered itself all over with glory.

With a broad-mindedness that is always commendable, and with an action prompt and business like, the Court last Saturday made a six mill levy for the construction of a modern up-to-date building which is to cost the people \$25,000 when completed.

There is every reason for this enterprising move on the part of the Court and not one against it. Klamath County's advancement demands it and the taxpayers can well afford to pay the bill.

The building will be modern in all of its equipments. The assembly room, recitation rooms, laboratories, etc., will

be arranged with a view to comfort, health and the accommodation of a growing population. Modern heating apparatus will be installed in the basement where will also be arranged a commodious gymnasium room and equipment.

Judge Baldwin will make a tour of the Coast at an early date visiting San Francisco, Portland, Ashland, Roseburg, and Eugene, where he will examine buildings of this class to inform himself as to which is the best, and the new High School building here will get the benefit of this knowledge.

It is expected to have everything ready to accept plans and start the work on the new building at the meeting of the March term of the County Court.

\$4,000 REAL ESTATE DEAL THIS WEEK

Joseph G. Pierce became the owner of the Maple property last Saturday designated on the records as lots 5 and 6 in block 34. This property is situated at the corner next to Wampler's butcher shop and is regarded as one of the most valuable business tracts in the city.

The consideration paid was \$4,050. Mr. Pierce expects to put up a two-story stone building on his new purchase early in the spring.

CITY TAX LEVY VALID.

The city report that there would be no city tax levy this year is erroneous. The town recorder failed to certify the levy to the county clerk within the proper time, but this error has been cured. Judge Drake and other local attorneys coincide with the theory of right to make such correction and Attorney General Crawford has rendered an opinion at the request of the Court to the same effect.

The city school board was too late to make its special levy, but the school district is not seriously discommoded on this account.

BANK STOCKHOLDERS MEET.

The first National Bank of Klamath Falls held a meeting last Wednesday at which an election was held and other business transacted. The old officers were re-elected and two new directors were added. Charles E. Warden and Fred Melhase were added to the list of directors.

The boy stole a lady's watch from a place where he was staying in Ashland and also stole a five dollar gold piece from another home. Along with this he took a pocket lamp. He then bought a boy's wagon with the \$5 and left Ashland drawing the wagon with him. A few miles out of town he stopped at Spencer's ranch and traded the watch, wagon and lamp for a horse and then came to Klamath Falls, riding bareback all the way. Here he succeeded in stealing a horse and forging three orders before he was apprehended.

DEATH OF AN OLD KLAMATH CITIZEN

John I. Donnell, a pioneer of Klamath County, died at his home near Dairy yesterday morning at six o'clock.

Deceased was a well known citizen. He had lived here many years and was respected and beloved by all who knew him. He was once postmaster at Dairy and also kept a store there.

He was a prominent member of the local lodge A. O. U. W. and leaves a policy of \$2,000 to his heirs, his wife having died a few years ago. He has four children living, all fairly grown up.

He once drove the stage between Klamath Falls and Bly. He was also an ex-soldier of the civil war. The arrangements had not been made for the funeral at the time the Republican went to press.

The deceased was born in West Moreland County, Pennsylvania, Jan. 15, 1843.

DEATH OF LOUIS SEEDS.

A telegram was received from Victor, Colorado, yesterday announcing the sudden death at that place of Louis Seeds of Klamath Falls. His brother Joe left for Colorado this morning. The cause of death is not known. A telegram was received early in the day announcing his serious illness and later his death was reported.

He was a member of the local A. O. U. W. lodge and carried \$1000 insurance. It has not been decided yet whether his body will be buried in Colorado or brought to Klamath Falls.

C. P. HUGHES PASSES AWAY.

The death of Charles P. Hughes, of Poe Valley, was reported some time ago to have taken place at Sacramento. It was afterwards corrected. It now appears, however, that Mr. Hughes died at Woodland, California. Following is taken from the Ashland Times of last Monday:

"Charles P. Hughes, whose home was in Poe Valley, where he owned an extensive ranch, and a well known citizen of Klamath County, died at Woodland, Cal., last Friday, aged about 58 years. Deceased was a brother-in-law of Carl P. Van Riper, of Ashland, and had relatives in Grants Pass and Crescent City, Cal. and formerly resided in this valley where he has many acquaintances. He had been in failing health for some months past and went to California from his Klamath County home about the first of last September, in the hope that treatment by specialists might effect a cure of his malady. He is survived by a widow and several children."

BRUTALLY MURDERED.

George Dunn, an aged Irish bachelor was brutally murdered at his home at Patrick's Creek on the stage road leading from Grants Pass to Crescent City last week.

Dunn had kept a stage station and stopping place for travelers for about 40 years and was supposed to have money. He did not believe in banks and claimed to have his money deposited in a rock pile near his place. This murder is supposed to have been committed for his money.

The stage driver found him dead on the floor of his cabin with a gash in his head and his body mutilated. An ax and club were used.

FATE OF BUTTE CREEK RANCHER.

David Zann, a Butte Creek rancher, started into the heart of the Cascades last week to visit a ranch which he had in that section. He took a trail used in summer and has not been heard from since. It is supposed he lost his way and was frozen.

MINISTER SMITH ATTACKS PROPOSED NEW CHARTER

EDITOR REPUBLICAN:

Dear Sir:—The proposed new charter will work great injustice to the major portion of our citizens. Yesterday I went to the hill tops and counted the residences with the following result:

In the proposed First ward there are 19; in the Second 47, and in the Third 97.

Then I kept tally while three prominent citizens well acquainted with our town named the voters and this was the result: First ward 20; Second 80; Third 110. They were not so well acquainted in the east end, and after I left them, I recalled several they had overlooked in the proposed Third ward.

Under the new charter the Mayor will have considerable appointive power, subject to the approval of a majority of the Council, and according to the proposed division the 100 voters of the First and Second wards will have four of the six councilmen, which is unfair to the 110 voters of the Third ward.

I therefore suggest that at least the following concession be made by whatever is the supposed superiority of the proposed First ward:

That a line be drawn through the middle of the street between Baldwin's

hardware store and the Exchange saloon, from the ditch on the north to Ewanna lake on the east, and that all west of this line and the ditch constitute the First ward. From this line to the center of Fifth street be the Second and all east of this the Third wards. This would place about 40 voters in the First, 50 in the Second and 90 in the Third, which would be yielding plenty to the supposed quality of the First, show respect for the second and still leave a little humiliation for the Third.

I do not wish to take space to argue the matter, but certainly it requires a great stretch of imagination, without any regard for past or present indications, to suppose that the rugged hills of the west side will be more rapidly peopled than the fast growing East End. I therefore humbly suggest that our Town Board approve the above, or some more just and equal division, and if they refuse, that a petition be at once circulated, and placed in the proper hands at Salem. Fellow citizens, let us play fair.
