CENTENNIAL FAIR NOTES

The Fire Department at the Lewis and Clark Exposition is now practicing daily, and making tests of water pressure. The Department has a fully equipped station and is able to cope with any blaze.

Hundreds of carloads of exhibits for the Lewis and Clark Exposition have already arrived and more coming every day. The cars are brought into the grounds by way of a spur and unloaded, the contents being stored in the finished exhibits palaces.

The electrical display at the Lewis and Clark Exposition will be one of the most unique and attractive ever planned for a like enterprise. No expense has been spared to make this feature most attractive.

Ornate staff work now in progress on the Bridge of Nations at the Lewis and Clark Exposition, will give the structure the appearance of an arched stone bridge of the most beautiful design. The bridge is 2000 feet long, connecting the mainland to the Government Peninsula.

Several concessions have been let at the Lewis and Clark Centennial which require considerably more space than the original plans for the "Trail" would permit. The amusement street will have to be enlarged so as to provide several thousand square feet of additional space.

Several hundred Burlington, (Ia.) people are planning to visit the Lewis and Clark Exposition in July, in order to be present at the sessions of the American Librarian's annual meeting, which will be held in Portland from July 2 to 7.

The railroad companies have extended the time limit for the shipping of exhibits from St. Louis to Portland until the latter part of March. This will serve materially to better the appearance of the exhibits for the Lewis and Clark Exposition, as it will afford exhibitors more time in which to assemble and pack them.

The Union Pacific is soon to issue an attractive folder regarding the Lewis and Clark Exposition, which will be distributed widely throughout the east and middle west. Several other roads have issued or will issue similar pamphlets.

Engineer T. H. Humphrey of the Government Reclamation Service, has received a quantity of sugar beet seed which he will distribute to the farmers of the Klamath Basin. This industry is bound to be a very important one in our county and the opportunity to experiment with the growing of sugar beets should be taken advantage of by our farmers.

Mr. and Mrs. James Wheeler, of Fort Klamath, who have been visiting relatives near Dairy, were in the city Friday on their return home. Mr. Wheeler states that he has nearing completion, a two story hall and lodge room opposite his present place of business. A public hall has been something that has been greatly needed at the Fort for some time.

Francis J. Bowne, who has been spending the winter at his old home in Sheldon, Iowa, arrived here the first of the week. Mr. Bowne has a 2400 acre ranch near the growing town of Bonanza, on which he last year established a pumping plant for irrigation purposes. This land will probably be covered by the government system, which will be cheaper than the private pumping system he now uses.

The Sheriff's office is having the busiest time of its life, the sheriff and two deputies are kept busy all day and until late at night making out receipts for taxes, but are unable to keep up with the rush. On Monday and Tuesday of this week taxes were received to the amount of \$10,550.40, and letters are in the possession of the sheriff estimated to contain about \$15,000 more, receipts for which have not been made yet.

Mr. W. K. Brown, manager of the Klamath Canal Company, states that they turned on the water in the sluice ditch this morning, and have demonstrated that their sluicing project will be a success. Only a small stream was turned into the ditch but this succeeded in carrying the dirt through the ditch. As fast as portions of the ditch reach the necessary depth, flumes will be constructed and this will be added to until the entire ditch is flumed. The water turned in this morning was only for an experiment but when the full force is turned on it will be ten times as great.

OLD OFFICIALS RE-ELECTED

The city election on Monday passed off quietly. J. W. Siemens for treasurer and C. C. Brower for recorder had no opposition. There were six names put up to be voted on for trustees and the five receiving the highest number of votes were elected. The vote was as follows:—Alex. Martin Jr., 201; B. St-Geo, Bishop, 153; L. F. Willits, 204; Frank Ward, 207; Fred Schallcock, 203; W. T. Elliott, 55.

The entire ticket elected is just as published in the Republican last week and goes to show that the people generally were in sympathy with the work of the old Board during the past year.

EVADES DEBTS AND WORRY

Man Takes Unique Vacation and Escapes Annoying Creditors.

Worried by financial difficulties brought about by speculation, a Rockland (Me.) business man solved the problem of evading his troublesome creditors by taking an inexpensive vacation for two months, says an eastern exchange.

"Most men in my trouble," he said, "would have gone to Canada. I didn't have money enough to get so far away, so I changed my name from James Emerson Smith to James Emerson, borrowed a leaky yawl, packed in some clothing and a few standard articles of food, took my wife and two children out to Sheep Island, and lived there quietly until the clouds rolled by and copper was shining once more.

"Unless you have tried it, you cannot imagine how cheaply a family can live on a wooded island in Penobscot bay. There are enough flat limestone lying loose on any of the islands to build a palace, and wood for fuel can be had from the growth which crowns the top of every island, though I got most of mine from the driftwood, which floated ashore at my doorstep. There are fat clams all along shore for the digging, sunners enough to last a family a week can be caught on a bent pin in half an hour's fishing; two marlin pots will supply all the lobsters you want; there are ood and hake and mackerel swimming all around you and waiting to be caught; with a shotgun you can kill wild ducks and snipe and plover, and with free rent and no taxes and no company to entertain you can live for almost nothing.

"A neighbor of mine who built a stone cottage for his family on Monroe Island told me the actual money cost of keeping himself, wife and three children for a year was less than \$30. I cannot say how much I put out, for I kept no account; but it was little—not more than \$40 for the two months that I was there."
