HIRE DOGS BY DAY OR WEEK

Philadelphia Stock Dealer Finds New Canine Rearing Department a Source of Revenue.

A pet stock dealer of Philadelphia has in his shop window a sign that reads:

DOGS TO HIRE
BY DAY, WEEK, OR HOUR.
Rates Reasonable.

A man asked the dealer the other day the significance of the sign.

"Oh, it means just what it says," the dealer said. "People like to hire dogs now and then, the same as they like to hire horses or ponies. I clear from this branch of my business quite \$10 a week."

"Do you see that handsome Russian wolfhound over there in the corner? Well, I hire him out a good deal to young women who are going to be photographed. In England a lot of women of fashion, and in America a lot of millinery, have had their pictures taken of late with Russian wolf hounds at their side. That has set a fashion. Young women all over, nowadays, desire to be photographed with wolf hounds."

"But do you know what a wolfhound like Pete there is worth? Well, sir, he is worth \$400 or \$500. And do you know what he can be hired for a couple of hours for? He can be hired for \$1.50. Hence he is hired often. He is in great demand. And on the mantel of many a poor man's house you can see to-day the wife's or the daughter's photograph, with a magnificent Russian hound in the foreground."

"Aside from hiring dogs for photographic purposes, I hire them for promenades. Young ladies, visiting the city, like to rent a Boston bull or a wire-haired Irish terrier to walk down Chestnut street with. A good dog on a morning's walk gives a young woman, you see, distinction, and it is now possible, thanks to me, for any girl to achieve this distinction for a dollar or two."

"The dogs there is most demand for are bulls, Boston bulls, terriers and wolf hounds. I require a deposit before I let a dog go out."

INDIANS VOTE IN OKLAHOMA

Hedkins Attach Great Interest to Election—Cast Ballots for Friends.

At the last election in Oklahoma three tribes of Indians voted, says the Klamath Falls Republican.

"Every German infantry regiment has its chiropodist," said a military attaché, "and it won't be many years before all infantry regiments will have their chiropodists, too."

"A foot soldier's efficiency, you see, depends upon his feet. If he gets sore feet, he can't march well—can't advance fast, can't retreat fast. And his feet are apt, unless they are scientifically looked after, to get sore; for it is one thing, you know, to use the feet in an ordinary way, walking three or four miles a day in a city, and it is quite another thing to use them in military fashion, walking 15, 20 and sometimes 30 miles a day over rough country, carrying luggage besides."

"A soldier's feet need looking after, need inspection, just as his gun does. Hence Germany has introduced chiropodists into her army, and the chiropodists hold feet inspection daily. They see that the shoes fit well, that the stockings are in good condition, that blisters and corns don't form."

"It is odd to see in Germany a line of privates having their feet inspected. This sight, though, will be a universal one ere long, and then its appearance of oddity will depart from it."

POWER IN BIG NAVY GUNS.

Machinist Explains Reason for Great Increase in Weight of Enormous Cannons.

Speaking of the development in the defensive powers of the modern guns of the American navy, as illustrated at the Washington naval gun factory, an experienced machinist and advance worker said to a Washington Star reporter:

"This general development is not due alone to improvements in guns or powder, or projectiles, but to the simultaneous and progressive development of all three."

"Less than half a century ago the heaviest gun known was the 68-pounder. This gun was about nine inches bore, and fired a 68-pound projectile, with a 16-pound charge of gunpowder, but was powerless against four and a half inches of wrought iron. Our battleships to-day are equipped with 12 inch guns, which, with a charge of 480 to 425 pounds of smokeless powder, are capable of driving an 850-pound projectile through 51 inches of solid wrought iron. In older times it required nearly four minutes to load and fire one of the now obsolete 68 pounders, while the new and terrible 12-inch guns can be loaded and fired in about 50 seconds with perfect safety."

"If a projectile from one of the old 68 pounders hit its mark, it was due to good luck, rather than to good management, but it is a matter of proud record that our modern 12-inch guns have scored seven hits in less than six minutes at target practice, while our six-inch gun has a record of nine shots and nine hits in one minute."

The statistics of a modern 12-inch breech-loading rifle, as turned out by the naval gun factory, makes an interesting showing. Its weight is 101,300 pounds, or over 45 tons. Its total length, 36 feet 8 inches. The greatest diameter of gun body is 45 inches; total length of bore, 419.20 inches; capacity of chamber, 12.043 cubic inches; total capacity of bore, 51.355 inches; travel of projectile, 346.96 inches; weight of charge, service velocity, 425 pounds; weight of projectile, 850 pounds; ratio of projectile weight to weight of gun, 1-119; chamber pressure, 15 tons; muzzle velocity (service), 2,100 feet per second; thickness of steel which shell will perforate at muzzle 24.16 inches; at 1,500 yards 29.94 inches.
