Engineer Humphrey stated to a Republican representative that there was plenty of money in the reclamation fund to carry out the Klamath project. There was in the fund on June 30, 1904, \$23,270,892.68. The amount remaining unexpended in this fund is \$19,095,886.01. Oregon alone has in the fund \$4,158,682.96. The amount expended to March 31, 1905, was \$89,507.55, leaving a fund available for expenditure of \$14,009,075.40. Since June 1904, there has been added to the fund from Oregon practically \$2,000,000.

**RAILROAD MEN VISIT THE CITY**

A. H. Nafziger and W. H. Holabird, of Los Angeles, were in the city the first two days of this week. Mr. Nafziger is the president of the Klamath Development Company, and also one of the buyers of the Weed railroad. Mr. Holabird is also interested in the new railroad and is the gentleman who represented the Development Company in inducing the people of Klamath county to raise the \$100,000 bonus.

These gentlemen were making a trip over the proposed route of the railroad and were here on business for their company. They stated that men were already at work on the road through the timber and that as soon as they were notified that the bonus was raised, engineers would be put in the field at once and a survey made of the road to Klamath Falls. They expressed themselves as very much pleased with the spirit shown by the people of the county and especially Klamath Falls and Wood River, and stated that they were ready to carry out their part of the agreement with as little delay as possible.

**KLAMATH INDIANS NOT CITIZENS**

Referring to the item lately going the rounds of the papers to the effect that the Attorney General has decided that the Klamath Indians as all-trees are ready for taxation and other rights and duties as citizens, Captain O. C. Applegate, who is in town today states that there is undoubtedly an error, since in no case have the Indians received their certificates or trust patents as an evidence of the completion of the act of allotment, and hence their status remains the same as before allotments were begun.

It is not likely that the work of completing the allotments can be made, nor any action be taken as to the extinction of the claims of the Indians to the tribal lands, until the matter growing out of the claim of the state to the swamp lands and of the military road company to the land grant, are fully and finally settled. This is unfortunate as it ties up for an indefinite time an area of land equal to the State of Rhode Island, which might otherwise be added to the lands taxable in Klamath county.

**CRATER LAKE RAILROAD BEGUN**

Tuesday was an occasion long to be remembered by the people of Medford and the Rogue river valley, being the inauguration of an enterprise which will do more to develop the latent resources of the country than anything which has occurred since the building of the Southern Pacific road through the valley.

The event was the turning of the first sod on the Medford & Crater Lake Railroad.

The territory through which this road is to be built is one of the richest in agricultural possibilities in Southern Oregon. It will tap a country capable of producing anything. To a certain extent the section lying between Medford and the timber belt has produced only grain and stock, notwithstanding its adaptability to the raising of more profitable products. Small fruits grow to perfection along the creek bottoms, and apples and pears find a congenial home in the foothills, but the difficulty of transporting the perishable products of their farms to market over twenty or more miles of rough roads has prevented many farmers from embarking in the fruit business. However, with the coming of the M. & C. L. R. R., bringing this region in touch with rail with the city markets a vast increase in the output of fruits may be looked for.

The timber clothed ridges of the Cascades first put the thought of a railroad into the minds of the promoters. Should there not be a dollar's worth of improvement made on the strength of the road between Medford and the timber belt, if the road did not have a pound of freight outside of the lumber cut by sawmills near its line, or carry a single passenger, yet the road would pay and thousands—nay millions—of dollars would be added to the amount realized by the products of Jackson county. The timber is sufficient to justify the building of the road, and the local traffic will represent the net profits on the investment.—Medford Mail.
