HIGH SCHOOL CONTRACT LET

The contract for the construction of a \$30,000 High School building for Klamath County has been let. Only two bids were submitted. The bid of W. P. McMillian for \$32,450 was rejected. The bid of Snook & Heckart for \$30,750, after being modified by changing from a concrete wall to a double wall and other changes so as to reduce the cost to \$29,500, was accepted. The contract provides that the building be constructed on or before January 1, 1906.

The County Commissioners had only contemplated expending \$25,000 on building, but it could not be constructed for this amount without changing the plans already decided upon.

The plans for the new building are considered as near perfect as possible and it was impossible to have made any changes that would have been satisfactory. The Commissioners' decision in having a building that will be a credit to Klamath County, will certainly meet with the approval of the citizens of the county. It was evident that if the building was not completed at this time, it would only cost a great deal more in the end.
