MEDICAL MENTION.

Among its many triumphs, modern surgery has worked a marvelous success in the operations for appendicitis. When it is inevitable the patient and friends may trust the surgeon with absolute confidence.

Dr. William Henry, an English physician, states as the result of experiments that in all forms of animal life, insects included, exists the taste for alcohol. He says that fishes are the only "real teetotalers" in creation.

The Munich Neueste Nachrichten announces that Frau Hilgen, of Tröstberg, Bavaria, has borne no less than six children in one year. She was delivered of triplets in January of last year and bore triplets again in December. The case is attracting much attention from the medical profession.

"Genius is some sort of neurosis," says Sir Frederick Treves, the celebrated English physician. "An uncalculated nervous disease. The few men of genius I have met were exceedingly impossible persons. They saw nothing in this world which was not interesting to them, and they were ever cheerful. It is not to be discouraged. RAILWAY RUMOR.

The German government railways employ 528,451 persons in 1903; the number of locomotives in use was 20,846.

The total length of the Russian railway system on January 1st was 37,371 1/2 miles. In 1904 there were thrown open to traffic 679 miles.

The final spike in the railroad from Canton to Bamahul was driven the other day. But before it had been driven down 24 hours it was stolen by the Chinese.

English railroad directors give prizes to station masters who keep the best cultivated flower beds at their respective stations. Some of the gardens thus maintained are beautiful.

In 1928 the butter haulage over the Minneapolis & St. Louis railroad was 400,000 pounds. Last year it was nearly 14,000,000, the gain coming wholly from developments of creameries along the railroad.

A report from Tcheran, the capital of the Persian empire, is to the effect that the Persian government is negotiating with Russia for the purpose of building a railroad from the Russian frontier to the capital of Persia.

Traffic through the railway tunnel at Port Huron, Mich., will soon be handled by six electric locomotives. The third rail system will be used, with the rail placed at the side of the tunnel to avoid accidents to workmen.

COMING METROPOLIS OF SOUTHERN OREGON

Klamath Falls, Oregon, is the important commercial and trading point of not only Klamath County, which is larger than Connecticut and Rhode Island combined, but also of a vast extent of the richest lands in the United States.

Twenty million feet, board measure, is a fair estimate of the standing pine timber tributary to Klamath Falls. Klamath County has 500,000 of rich valley lands, not one-tenth of which has been brought under cultivation. Land that will produce, under irrigation, more bushels of wheat, rye, oats, barley, potatoes, onions and sugar beets than any other section of God's footstool. Land that will produce the finest winter apples ever grown, the most luscious gooseberries, currants, cherries and plums; the finest horses and mules ever saddled or driven; the best beef, mutton and pork; the best butter and cheese, in America. Land that in most countries would readily sell for \$100 an acre.

Ever since Lewis and Clark discovered the Columbia, the Klamath Basin has been a cow country, now the awakening has come, the government has undertaken the reclamation and irrigation of 300,000 acres of the valleys, making the scheme as a whole the biggest thing in its line ever undertaken. It will cost \$18.50 per acre in ten annual payments, then the land owns the water.

The California & Eastern Oregon Railroad is building from Weed, California, 90 miles away, a standard gauge railroad, to Klamath Falls. Already the effect of these two great improvements are felt. Klamath Falls is growing. Property is advancing in value. Already a city of 1200 people, I predict 10,000 in 1908. Lots that can be had now for a modest price will then have advanced 300 to 500 per cent. Land that can be had for \$25 to \$40 per acre now, will be \$100 then. This is not all that can be said in favor of Klamath County or Klamath Falls.
