Have Not Signed Up Yet.

The government irrigation question is still unsettled, although it is believed that it is only a temporary delay, as with a few exceptions the resident land owners have signed up and shown the officials that they are anxious for irrigation.

The greater part of the unsigned lands either belong to estates which have not been settled or are owned by non-residents, and therefore very little blame can attach to anyone for the present delay. The Water Users' Association are doing all in their power to get these remaining lands signed and it is now considered a matter of time before there will be sufficient land to justify the government in commencing and carrying out the project.

It is stated that ten thousand acres more than the project will cover has been subscribed, but a considerable amount of this lies above and outside the proposed canal and therefore cannot be figured in the percentage necessary.

The following list was obtained from the Secretary of the Water Users' Association, and is a list of the supposed owners of the land which had not been subscribed up to yesterday. First Irrigation Project.

The first great step in the reclamation of the arid west through irrigation was celebrated near Reno, Nevada, on Saturday, June 17, where water to ultimately irrigate 200,000 acres was turned into a great diversion canal to the Carson river. It is just three years to the day since the passage of the reclamation act and the celebration signified the completion of the first project under that law.

The Truckee-Carson project has demonstrated the ability of the Government to carry out undertakings for the public good which are too great for any individual enterprise. The canals are substantial and permanently built. The massive headgates are of concrete. Already there has been rapid settlement in this district and new homes are popping up all along the line.

Notice to Water Users.

On account of the increased demand for water the past few months, and the unforeseen delays in the construction of the new power plant which is to furnish us power, the pump that is now in use is inadequate to supply the amount of water required for all purposes. Water for fire protection and household use of course takes precedent over all other uses, as it is a matter of protection of life and property.

The Company now have at Pokesgama a new pump that will give an abundant supply of water for all purposes, but owing to unforeseen delays in the construction of the new power plant, it will probably be from 60 to 90 days before we will complete the installation of the new pump. Therefore, to carry an ample supply of water in the reservoir for fire protection, it is necessary that we discontinue the lawn irrigation in the evening, and allow lawn irrigation only in the morning from 6 to 8 a. m. So on June 24th the same rules now in force regarding the irrigation of lawns, will be applied allowing irrigation only between 6 and 8 a. m. As soon as the new pump is in operation we will again allow the evening irrigation, and will so notify you.

Trusting that our patrons will bear with us in this temporary scarcity of water and that this arrangement may meet with your approval, we are, Klamath Falls Light & Water Company.
