Langell Valley Swamp Cut Out Of Irrigation Project.

During the last month the directors, secretary and the attorney of the Water Users Association have used every effort to induce the landowners to sign up with the association. To an extent they have succeeded, but there yet remains much to do before the government will construct the Klamath project. The engineers of the Reclamation service insist upon 95 per cent of the lands being signed and the surrender of all riparian rights, before construction will begin.

On the lower project about 80 per cent is signed and it now remains to be seen whether the remainder will come in. In the mean time we must watch the price of land go down and hear Klamath county knocked on every side for delaying to accept an opportunity which comes indeed to but a few communities and then only once in a life time.

It was thought that the Upper Klamath project including Langell and Alkali valleys, was lost. Two large tracts in Langell valley owned by Mrs. Ralston and Mr. Beckman have not been signed and the owners declare that they will not come into the Water Users Association. A conversation with the engineers brings out a fact that will certainly be welcomed by the enthusiasts in the upper project. By cutting out the two holdings above mentioned together with the Bowne tract near Bonanza, irrigated by a pumping plant, the partially irrigated Shook ranch and the Harpold land under a private reservoir system, the Horsely reservoir will amply irrigate the remainder. This scheme will satisfy all concerned and at the same time eliminate the necessity of draining Langell valley and thus very much reduce the cost.

It is understood that two engineering parties will be put to work at once in Alkali valley and on the east of Langell valley.

Hurrah for Alkali!
