

**COOPERATIVE
FEDERATION**

Whereby Labor Will Divide Profits With Capital.

The Cooperative Christian federation, organized with the purpose of finding a just basis for profit-sharing between laborer and capitalist, and incorporated under the laws of Oregon yesterday, has decided that 5 per cent on the money invested is the capitalist's fair share, and if the federation, after paying all wages, fixed charges, interest on bonds and expenses of every nature, including 25 per cent of the net for extensions and improvements, and 10 per cent to the church, shall have a surplus to be divided, this surplus shall be apportioned between the capitalist and the worker on the ratio of \$3 a day to the worker and 5 per cent to the capitalist until the latter shall have received a total revenue of 10 per cent on his bonds. Beyond that point he shall no longer be considered in the division of the remaining surplus.

The promoters say that heretofore there have been too many middlemen among whom the joint earnings of capital and labor were parcelled. There has been the man who worked with his hands, the man who invested money in the bonds of the company, the man who held the stock of the corporation, and the high-salaried officers who, by virtue of controlling a majority of stock or bonds, or both, had the power, arbitrarily, to fix their compensation, and that of their favorites, far above what their services were really worth.

Surplus for Two Classes.

The cooperative people say there will be but two classes among whom the surplus earnings of the joint operations of capitalist and worker shall be divided—namely, the actual investors of the money, and the actual workers and managers. By confining the distribution to these two classes, they say, a much larger dividend can be legitimately paid to the capitalist, and the use of his money, and a larger wage can be secured by the worker for his toil.

The wage basis, it is explained, cannot be arbitrarily fixed until it is known what conditions are to surround the laborer. In a general way, it is stated that the worker in each department of labor shall receive the prevailing wages paid for his class of work.

But attention is called to the plan of domestic organization proposed by the federation. This plan provides that the workers' community shall be provided free with many necessities and comforts which the worker in ordinary communities must pay for. There will be free baths, free water, free lights, free libraries and amusements, free medical attendance and a building plan under which every man may own his own home and escape rent.

There will be many other advantages that will count, they say, on the side of the worker in estimating the cost of his living and the size of his wages.

Buy at Wholesale.

He will be able to buy all clothing, groceries and other things needful at wholesale prices, as the federation will buy direct from manufacturers or manufacture for itself, and the federation stores will be conducted on the cost basis. He will, in brief, live in a community where economic principles are applied from first to last for the benefit of the worker and the bondholder, and for no others.

The safety of the financial side of the federation plan rests, the financiers say, in Oregon's adaptability to the whole federation proposition, and to the provision that 40 per cent of the moneys subscribed on bonds shall be retained by the Trust Company of America and invested in securities of the class that are approved by the state of New York for investments of life insurance company funds. They have entire confidence that Oregon properties, developed from present existing conditions, will naturally increase in value in a very large ratio, and render the bonded investment secure to the investors for the other 60 per cent, which is to be put into development work in the lands and cooperative industries.

Business Men in Charge.

The affairs of the federation will be managed by practical business men representing the trust companies and federation members, but the former will have absolute control until the bonds are paid. It is provided that the bonds may run for a period of 50 years, or may be retired at any time after five years, at the opinion of the federation. Members of the federation may acquire bonds individually, and it is expected by many of the

members that they will, long before the expiration of 50 years, become the holders of all the bonds, and the federation trust will have paid them. The managing board or executive committee of the trust will receive \$5,000 annually to cover compensation and office expenses. The federation will, it is said, proceed at all times on the theory that business ability shall command fair compensation, and that the management of the business of the federation must be kept in the hands of experienced and capable business men and financiers.

Ultimately, it is said, the federation will have paid its entire bonded debt and the actual business control will come to the federation membership irrespective of the federation trust that during its initial period has entire charge of its business affairs.

Federation Members Will Control.
It is argued that safety will ultimately be assured for the reason that the federation will have educated its own business managers and evolved its own financiers, and they will be capable of assuming the functions of management and control when these shall be relinquished by the trust companies and their representatives.

The corporation feature of the plan is constructed in the form of a trust. The stock carries no dividend, but is held perpetually in trust by the committee known as the federation trust. This trust is clothed by the articles of incorporation with the powers of other trust companies, and may transact business in similar ways, as the agent of the federation. The total capital stock is \$150,000. A three fourths vote of the entire membership of the federation is necessary to change the constitution.

The federation has a distinct board of directors, which will be initiative in its functions, and will originate and propose to the executive committee of the trust any measures that it may desire. The power to vote these measures remains with the executive committee. The board of directors number 15, of whom six constitute a quorum. They will be appointed by the president, subject to confirmation by vote of the federation. So long as supervision of the affairs of the federation by the trust continues, it shall accept three members of this board of directors to act on the trust board.—Oregon Journal.
