Crater Lake Done In Oil

Edwin L. Forker, a Klamath Falls artist of ability, has just finished a panorama view of Crater Lake in oil colors. The painting is 30 by 120 inches and is the largest known and is considered by critics to be the best reproduction on canvas of this national wonder.

The view is taken from the south side looking toward the north and shows all the celebrated points known to visitors. Besides the Lake itself the picture shows Victor Rock, Palisades, Red Cloud Cliff, The Watchman, Glacier Peak, Sentinel Rock, Castle Craig, Wizard Island, Mt. Scott and Mt. Thielsen.

The painting will be on exhibition at Holabird's office Friday and Saturday afternoon. Next week it will be taken to Portland where it will be placed on exhibition at the Exposition.

Mr. Forker has painted a number of pictures of Crater Lake, all of them smaller than this one. He considers this one the best picture he has painted and he feels satisfied with his work.

Another room was devoted to Indian relics, baskets, bows and arrows, beads and other specimens of handicraft of the Klamath. Some very fine photographs of members of this tribe were shown. The collection of baskets is by far the largest and best in the county.

In the big studio which was appropriately decorated, dainty tables were set and refreshments were served by Misses Lizzie Houston, Vera Houston, Barbara Goeller, Hazel Goeller and Hattie White. The Ford family furnished the music, the piano used was kindly loaned by Mr. Lineback. The walls of this room were arranged with large photographs suitable for framing purposes, which work Miss Baldwin is making a specialty of.
