Order in Escheat Proceedings.
In the circuit court of the State of Oregon,
for the county of Klamath.

The State of Oregon, Plaintiff, vs. George
Chastain, as executor of the estate of Ben-
jamin Howard, late of Klamath county,
Oregon, and all other persons claiming to be
heirs of Benjamin Howard, deceased, Defend-
ants.

Order in Escheat Proceedings.
An information having been duly filed in
this court in the above entitled action, by W.
J. Moore, District Attorney for the Second
Prosecuting Attorney of Oregon and H. W.
Keece as special and additional counsel for
said state, and it appearing from such infor-
mation that the sum of \$98.21 lawful money
of the United States, now in the custody and
possession of defendant, George Chastain, as
county clerk of Klamath county, Oregon, has
for reasons set forth in said information es-
cheated to the State of Oregon, and it further
appearing from said information that one
Benjamin Howard, late of Klamath county,
Oregon, now deceased, was the last person
lawfully seized and possessed thereof, and
that on or about the 28th day of April, 1887,
the said Benjamin Howard died intestate, in
Marion county, Oregon, leaving no heirs, wife
or known kindred capable of inheriting
said sum of money; and that said Benjamin
Howard, immediately prior to his death was a
resident and inhabitant of Klamath county,
Oregon, and left an estate therein. That on
the 14th day of February, 1888, one G. W. J.
Wilson was duly appointed administrator of
the estate of said Benjamin Howard, deceased,
and that said estate was duly and completely
administered upon, and said administrator
duly relieved and discharged from his trust as
such administrator by the order of the county
court in and for Klamath county, Oregon, that
all debts against the estate of said Benjamin
Howard, deceased, and all debts and expenses
of administration have been paid and fully
satisfied. That upon the settlement of the
final account in said estate there was found
to be a balance of \$98.21, belonging to said
estate, unclaimed and unexpended, which
said sum of money was by an order of the
county court of Klamath county, Oregon, on
or about the day of May, 1890, deposited
with the then county clerk of said county, by
the administrator G. W. Wilson, and ever
since said time has been in possession and
custody of such clerk and now is in the pos-
session and custody of defendant George Chastain
as county clerk of said Klamath county, by
virtue of and in accordance with the order of
the county court heretofore mentioned, which
said order has never been revoked, and that
in consequence thereof said sum of \$98.21,
has escheated to the State of Oregon, and said
State has a right by law to said money and all
thereof. That the defendant George Chastain
has no right, title or interest in or to said sum
of money or any part thereof, except the
right to the possession and custody thereof, in
accordance with the order of the county court
of Klamath county, Oregon, heretofore men-
tioned.

It also appears from said information that
the Governor of the State of Oregon directed
the said District Attorney to file said infor-
mation on behalf of the State of Oregon, and
that said governor also appointed H. W. Keece,
Attorney at Law, residing in Klamath Falls,
Oregon, as special and additional counsel for
the State of Oregon in the premises.

Said information also contains a demand
for judgment in favor of the State of Oregon,
to the effect that it be adjudged by the court
that said State has a right by law to all of said
sum of money to-wit: \$98.21, and its owner
and entitled to the possession thereof.

It is therefore ordered that all persons in-
terested or claiming to be interested in the
estate of said Benjamin Howard, deceased,
appear and show cause, if any they have,
within six weeks from the first publication of
this order, why the title, ownership and right
of possession to the above described \$98.21,
lawful money of the United States, should not
vest in the State of Oregon.

It is further ordered that this order be pub-
lished for six consecutive weeks from the
date thereof, in a newspaper of general cir-
culation, published in Klamath county, Oregon,
and that the first publication thereof be made
