PROCLAMATION.

Whereas, the Secretary of State of the State of Oregon, has notified me in writing that pursuant to the provisions of an act entitled "An Act making effective the initiative and referendum provisions of Section I of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, and regulating elections thereunder and providing penalties therefor," approved February 24, 1933, the People's Power League of Oregon duly filed in his office on February 24, 1936, an initiative petition, containing 5542 signatures properly attached to a copy of said measure, certified in accordance with law, demanding that a proposed amendment to Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Oregon be designated in the Constitution as Section I of Article IV of said Constitution, and shall be submitted to the legal voters of the State of Oregon for their approval or rejection at the general election to be held in said state on the 4th day of June, being the first Monday in June, 1936, designated by said People's Power League of Oregon as "Constitutional amendment for the initiative and referendum on local, special and municipal laws and parts of laws," which said proposed amendment is hereinafter particularly set forth.

Now, THEREFORE, I, Geo. E. Chamberlain, Governor of the State of Oregon, in obedience to the provisions of said act, hereby make and issue this Proclamation to the people of the State of Oregon, announcing that the People's Power League of Oregon has filed in said office a petition with the requisite number of signatures thereto attached, demanding that there be submitted to the legal voters of the State of Oregon for their approval or rejection at the regular election to be held on the 4th day of June, 1936, and day being the first Monday in said month, a proposed amendment to Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, to be designated in the Constitution as Section I of Article IV of said Constitution, designated by said People's Power League of Oregon as "Constitutional amendment for the initiative and referendum on local, special and municipal laws and parts of laws," which said proposed amendment is as follows:

"Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Oregon shall be and hereby is amended by inserting the following section in said Article IV after Section 1, and before Section 2, and it shall be designated in the Constitution as Section I of Article IV:

"Section 1A. The referendum may be demanded by the people against any or more items, sections or parts of any act of the legislative assembly in the same manner in which such power may be exercised against a complete act. The filing of a referendum petition against one or more items, sections or parts of an act shall not delay the remainder of that act from becoming operative. The initiative and referendum powers reserved to the people by this Constitution are hereby extended to the legal voters of every municipality and district as to all local, special and municipal legislation of every character in or for their respective municipalities and districts. The manner of exercising said powers shall be prescribed by general laws, except that cities and towns may provide for the manner of exercising the initiative and referendum powers as to their municipal legislation. Not more than ten per cent of the legal voters may be required to order the referendum, nor more than fifteen per cent to propose any measure by the initiative in any city or town."

Description of a Trap That Gave the Captive a Ride After It Is Caught.

WATERSPOUT IN THE ALPS.

Startling Phenomenon Recently Witnessed in One of the Mountain Lakes.

The rare spectacle of a waterspout on one of the Swiss lakes was witnessed, and fortunately photographed, on the afternoon of June 19 last. The phenomenon appeared at a little after four o'clock, in the middle of the Lake of Zug, which lies at the foot of the Rigi. Observers at Felsenegg saw a vaporous cone form in the lower part of the clouds hanging over the lake, while at the same time the water directly beneath began to wrinkle in a peculiar manner. Then a foaming basin, with high, whirling walls of water, some 30 feet in diameter, formed in the center of the lake. A huge jet of water leaped upward, while the cloudy cone descended from above until a funnel was formed connecting the lake with the clouds. The height of the funnel was estimated at from 4,000 to 5,000 feet. The entire phenomenon traveled southward with a high wind, and lasted about 25 minutes.

Rivers Under Deserts.

The desert places are flowing with rivers. The great Sahara, to the south of Algeria, is deriving great benefits as the outcome of a government irrigation mission, which has been intrusted with the task of boring for water at considerable depths. In many parts abundant springs have been met with close to the surface and enable cultivation of land which has long been waste. Some of the borings may reach a depth of from 1,650 feet to close upon 2,000 feet. Already it is possible in certain of the palm groves in the oases to get double the water formerly available.

"Balaklava" Bugles.

Bugles that "sounded the charge of the Light Brigade at Balaklava" are as common in England as the original cherry trees that George Washington did not cut down are in America. Now Lord Tredegar, who was one of the 600, says the charge was not sounded; that the troopers were among the guns before anyone thought of a bugle order.
