ODDITIES OF INVENTION.

Prof. Balaridi, of Turin, has suc-  
ceeded in perfecting his invention of  
photographing the eye and ad-  
vances its practical use for diagnosis of  
diseases of that organ.

A French engineer named Otto has  
invented an apparatus for purifying  
drinking water at home; its capacity is  
60 gallons an hour, and its cost about  
the same as that of an electric incan-  
descence light. Ozono is generated  
which kills all germs in the water.

In some parts of the west where  
irrigation is much depended upon, a  
"current motor" is in use which, by  
an ingenious use of levers and iron  
blades, makes the water of flowing  
streams pump itself. The pressure of  
the current causes the blade to swing  
backward and forward, and the force  
thus exerted is communicated to ma-  
chinery which runs a pump.

The recent classification at the Brit-  
ish Patent office shows that cooking is  
the popular subject of invention, having  
been the subject of 3,575 British  
patents in 48 years, or an average of  
73 a year. Umbrellas brought out  
1,457 inventions, and hats 1,411. In-  
ventions tend to run in grooves. 1,896  
and 1,897 reflecting the enormous de-  
velopment in cycles, while motor ve-  
hicle inventions have doubled since  
1900.

NOTICE

The first volume of the unpublished  
writings of the late Theodore Monzien  
has been prepared for publication by  
Prof. Otto Herzerich, the literary ex-  
ecutor of the deceased historian.

Rider Haggard is best known in  
America as a writer of startling romances,  
but in his own country he is recog-  
nized as an earnest student of the great  
problem of the poor. For years the au-  
thor has been laboring for the develop-  
ment of the agricultural side of English  
life as a means of relieving the congested  
conditions of large cities.

Anthony Hope, the British novelist  
and playwright, was educated for the  
law, but says himself in his droll way  
that he failed to make a living at his  
profession and had to turn to writing for  
his living.

It will probably seem strange to some  
that John Hay in his later life was  
inclined to be rather ashamed of "Little  
Brooks" and "Jim Blund." The two of  
his poems that have always been the  
most widely quoted. Similarly James  
Russell Lowell was rather ashamed in  
his declining years of the "Biglow Pa-  
pers," which many regard as his most  
original and effective work, and Minister  
Phipps never liked to be quoted as  
the author of that immortal poem about  
Eskimo Junction.

William Dean Howells has some  
engaging words to say to young aspirants  
for literary honors. "There is room for  
a good story of any kind," he said,  
recently. "Although an editor governs  
his judgment by what his readers have  
liked before, often rejecting something  
they would much better like if it were  
done well. It is true, however, that  
if he goes on with a word of advice, 'I do  
not believe anyone can write a novel,  
with rare exceptions, until he has lived  
at least 25 years in experience of the  
world.'"

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
