Ruined City to Rebuild

San Francisco, April 22.—The fire is out, only smoking embers remaining. The condition of the homeless and shelterless people encamped in various parts of the city is now remarkably good and offers of substantial assistance are being rapidly received from cities in all sections of the United States.
The committee having in charge the relief of the hungry reports that every homeless man, woman and child in San Francisco is being cared for and that there is no suffering on the score of either food or drink within the city.
The Associated Press, for the purpose of determining with accuracy the boundaries of the conflagration, sent out an automobile today, which skirted the fire on its four sides. The register of this machine at the end of the trip showed that it had traveled 26 miles, which, therefore, may be taken as the length of the line along which the flames traveled. This area included the financial, commercial and most of the densely populated portion of the residence district, with all the splendid institutions and great mansions that had grown up with the progress of the city. The extent of the burned area is seven square miles.
Many of the most substantial business men and property owners of San Francisco are in consultation with the architect. While the work of clearing away the debris goes forward a great corps of draughtsmen will be busily occupied preparing plans for the new buildings.
It is understood that James D. Phelan will be one of the first to rebuild on Market street. His plans are not complete, but call in general for a fine structure at Market and O'Farrell streets. Mr. Phelan recently purchased the property adjoining and reaching to Stockton street. His intention is to cover the entire frontage with buildings as soon as can be done.
All Banks to Rebuild.
Practically every bank in San Francisco will be rebuilt. All of these institutions have Eastern connections and many of them are affiliated with foreign banks. Owing to the great prosperity of San Francisco the local institutions, almost without exception, have large deposits to their credit in New York and European capitals. This money will be available at once, and after the strain of the moment has been relieved, building operations will begin.
