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The Political Situation.

We wish to put the situation squarely before the republican voters of Klamath county. REPUBLICANS SURE TO WIN

Landslide is Certain For the State and County Tickets on Next Monday

Democratic Campaign Methods Resented

The last gun of the campaign has been fired and ere its echo dies away, victory will perch on the banners of the republican hosts in Oregon and Klamath county. The campaign has been a remarkable one in certain respects. What promised to be the cleanest contest in the history of Oregon politics has degenerated into the meanest, most cowardly, character-assassinating assault ever witnessed in this state. Instead of fighting in the open or making the campaign on party issues, the democratic state organization has adopted the anonymous circular medium, and for the past ten days the mails have been burdened with thousands of scurrilous attacks on the public and private life of Jonathan Bourne, Jr. No one can question a campaign conducted along party lines and issues. It is the black-hand method that meets with the condemnation of all fair minded citizens, and this is what has occurred in this cowardly attack on Mr. Bourne. It has brought to his support thousands of voters, who, if a clean campaign had been waged would have remained with their party.

Likewise, the un-American attack that was made on Withycombe, has brought to his support scores of the leading democrats of the state, and will result in his being elected by the biggest majority ever given a candidate for governor. The rest of the state ticket is as safe as if they were already elected.

An Indorsement of Roosevelt.

President Roosevelt is extremely desirous that the full republican ticket in Oregon shall be elected in June. All reports to the contrary are unfounded. Senator Fulton had a long talk with the president recently about the situation in Oregon and the president in most unqualified terms expressed his desire that the republicans shall roll up an unprecedented majority at the coming election. The president was anxious to get all the facts about the situation, and was much interested in Mr. Fulton's explanation of the situation.

When he learned the facts, the president authorized Mr. Fulton to say that he was not only anxious for an overwhelming republican victory, but that he looked to Oregon to uphold its reputation. He is anxious for a great party victory, not alone for the benefits that will accrue to Oregon, but because Oregon fires the first gun of the campaign and is usually a true indicator of the general result of the fall elections to follow.

Jacob Rueck is meeting with practically the same success as his running mate. The people of the county are standing by him loyally, and his election is practically conceded by the opposition.

M. D. Williams is the third candidate on the republican ticket against whom an opposition candidate was nominated. Mr. Williams is a young man of recognized ability. He has been with the government and the large corporations that are spending thousands of dollars in and around Klamath Falls, and they are not employing men who are incompetent. His character is above reproach, and his record is one in which no flaw can be found. The unwarranted aspersion cast in this direction does not, we believe eliminate from, or meet with the approval of Mr. Williams opponent. He has more of the man and less of the sneak in his make up to endorse any such cowardly tactics, and the professional training of these two men places them above petty politics.

A Final Word.

Throughout this campaign the Republican has confined itself within the bounds of propriety. It has indulged in nothing but the plain, unvarnished statement of facts. It has sought to place before its readers what it believed to be to their welfare, and it is confident that this plan of campaign has met with approval and will produce results at the polls.

Too often it is customary in the closing days of a campaign to spring a surprise. These surprises have invariably proven to be mere nests. Let every voter study the situation dispassionately and decide for himself whether he wants to cast his vote in a manner that will show his approval of the fight Roosevelt is making for the common people; and whether he wants a fair, safe, conservative business administration.
