The vault will be steel throughout and be protected by manganese doors.

This office was presented this week with a box of the famous 16 to 1 strawberries, raised by E. J. Arant at Ashland. We are indebted to Mr. W. F. Arant for this kindly remembrance and thoughtful courtesy. The berries were perfect in shape and of a delicious flavor, and it required only 16 of them to fill the box to overflowing. Mr. Arant has 1 1/2 acres planted in strawberries, and has departed from the usual methods adopted in cultivating. The result has been that in that part where he has followed original methods his plants will produce one gallon each, which is considerable larger than that yielded by the plants treated in the usual way. So successful has he been that, though his output is very great, it falls far short of meeting the demand. This was readily admitted by those who saw the berries brought over by Mr. Arant.
