The County Election.

"What's the use a-kickin'?" since the die is cast and the result cannot be changed? There is none. The only thing left to do is for the republicans to profit by their mistakes and get ready for the future. The result of the election in this county shows the fallacy of tactical strife, and the one aim of the future should be to mend the broken line and prepare to enter the next campaign as one co-hesive whole. The republicans of Klamath county and the state have foolishly been pulling the chestnuts out of the fire for the democrats for many years, with the result that the opposition has been enjoying the fruits of victory at the expense of the democrat party. We wonder how long this is to continue? There was no excuse for a bolt this year. No candidate was jammed down the throats of the people. It was their own choosing. Each and every man on the ticket was above the average, and no fair reason existed for his not getting the full party vote. The defeat of the ticket is to be regretted, but we hope it will result in the future unification of all members and the burying of the hatchet so deep that it will never be found.

The Future

Now that the election is over and political questions have been settled, let every man get down and boost for Klamath county—not for one town or section but for the county as a whole. In today's issue of the Republican we print an interview with Mr. C. E. Wantland, who is general sales agent for the Union Pacific railroad. This gentleman from the very nature of his position, is eminently qualified to speak of the needs and prospects of Klamath county. We commend his remarks to our readers. Two things stand out prominently in his remarks: First, do not place the price of lands too high, for it will result in turning the tide of immigration to other districts, equally, if not better, situated to meet their needs; and, second, let the outside world know what we have here.

These two points should be borne well in mind by the property owners of this country. Throughout the west are vast government irrigation projects under

way. Some are nearing completion. These districts are equal to ours, and the prices of land as low as this. The people of these districts are bending every energy to bring into their section, and are offering flattering inducements. This work is having its effect, and unless this district does likewise, it is going to take a much longer period to bring about the degree of development contemplated to be accomplished in a couple of years.

All sectionalism must be laid aside; every man must work hand in hand for the accomplishment of one common purpose and no stone should be left unturned to aid in the up-building of Klamath county as a whole.

GRAND CELEBRATION ON JULY FOURTH.

Preparations Being made for A Gala Day.

On July 4 one of the biggest celebrations in the history of the county will be held in Klamath Falls. Bonanza, Merrill and the rest of the county will join with this city in making it a memorable occasion and from sunrise until midnight there will be something doing every minute.

An organization has already been perfected and committees appointed to look after the arrangements. A large amount of money has already been subscribed, and more is being added to the list every day. These funds are to be used as purses for baseball games, races, music, fireworks and decorations. A Goddess of Liberty contest has been inaugurated, and the prospects are that it will be a lively one.

At sunrise on the morning of the 4th this city is to be awakened by anvils. This cannonading is to continue every ten minutes for several hours. At ten o'clock a monster parade will form, to be participated in by the school children, business men and citizens. Prizes are to be offered for the prettiest and most original designs. The parade will be followed by speech-making, each orator to be limited to not more than fifteen minutes. This will conclude the exercises for the forenoon. At 1 o'clock the fun will begin at the race track. The base ball game will be preceded by foot, sack, three-legged greased polo and greased pig races. Between the innings of the

base ball game will occur the horse races. After these will be held boat and tub races on the lake and in the evening will be the grandest display of fireworks ever witnessed in Southern Oregon. After the fireworks will come the dance.

This is a general outline of the program. Many additions will be made to it, and everything will be done to make the occasion one of interest, instruction and pleasure.

About Insurance

The insurance companies have instructed all their agents that on and after June 1st, an advance of 25 per cent will be made in insurance rates. At the same time these same companies are adopting tactics in San Francisco that will cause those who carried insurance at the time of the earthquake to lose one-third of their insurance. When it is remembered that these companies went into San Francisco with their eyes wide open, knowing full well that the city was subject to earthquakes, it is manifestly unfair that the entire Pacific coast should be compelled to pay for their mistakes.

This insurance in the rate is going to be a hardship, and will undoubtedly result in one of the strongest protests ever made on issues of this kind. It has only begun and by the time it is ended the insurance people will know more about the pulse of the people of this coast than heretofore.

Important Notice.

We wish to caution all persons against disconnecting either electric light or telephone wires from any building or pole, as within the next few days there will be electric current on the electric wires the full 24 hours, making it extremely dangerous for anyone to disturb any wires.
