Sunday Train Discontinued

Alex Martin, Jr.: "We must have Sunday trains. They are absolutely essential at this time. Mr. Weyerhaeuser can't understand conditions here or the change would not have been made."

J. L. Buell: "It is a shame. Here we are on the very verge of a great influx of home-seekers and investors. To be compelled to wait over Sunday is inflicting an unnecessary hardship on them. The order ought to be rescinded."

B. St. Geo. Bishop: "It occurs to me that the interests of this section, which has and is contributing so much to this railroad, should have been consulted before this change was made. We need and ought to have Sunday trains and steps should be taken to have them retained."

L. F. Willits: "The change is a mistake. One would think that Klamath Falls was a way station instead of a city. As well discontinue Sunday trains to Frisco or Portland."

Geo. R. Hurn: "It is the hardest knock this city can get. If there were another road in here it would be different, but to close up the only gateway we have is an infernal outrage. What must strangers, who have heard so much of our greatness, think when they have to lay over Sunday at Thrall. The suspension of the Sunday service is inflicting a great wrong on Klamath county, and ought not to be put into effect."

D. B. Campbell: "I don't understand it. If this had occurred last winter there might have been some excuse for it; but taking off this train at this time, when the people are just beginning to come in here, is incomprehensible. I hope enough pressure can be brought to bear on the officials of the road to have the order rescinded, for if it is not it will do this county very material damage."

No Bids Received.
There were no bids received by the Reclamation service for the nineteen miles of main canal and twenty-seven miles of laterals. The failure of contractors to submit bids is attributed to the scarcity of laborers on the Pacific slope.

The matter has been reported to the Secretary of the Interior, who has the final disposition of it. It is not unlikely that the work will be undertaken by the government, and if this is done it will result in its completion on schedule time.
