### FUTS BAN ON LOVE BY MAIL

Postmistress Issues Cruel Manifesto  
Against the Boys and Girls  
at Glassport, Pa.

Pittsburg, Pa.—The postmistress of Glassport, Mrs. R. M. Kuzack, who is just the "spoiling" age, is not popular with the young men and women of that town. A flood of letters has poured through her hands of late. How the postmistress knew they were love letters is something the young people of the town are determined to fathom. When they reached the post office they read a notice which said that no more "love making" would be permitted in the post office and that "all boys and girls under 18 years of age must have a written order from their parents before mail is delivered."

Mrs. Kuzack says the young people of the neighborhood have been stimulating their love affairs through the United States mail, many tender missives being exchanged. She says the parents complained, and to protect herself she posted the notice. The young people declare they will use their influence with the department to find out how the postmistress knew love missives were being received. Meanwhile McKeepert, three miles away, shows an increase in mail, Glassport young people exchanging correspondence through that office now.

### MEXICO BUYS MOST HERE.

Southern Republic Purchases Three-Fifths of Her Imported Goods from United States.

Of all the goods Mexico buys abroad she gets three-fifths from the United States. Of all the goods she sells abroad she sends three-quarters to the United States. To be exact, the precise proportions are 59 per cent. and 76 per cent., respectively. There is no other country, except Canada, which buys so large a part of her imports from us, and there is no other country, except Cuba, which sells so large a part of her exports to us. The last decade and a half have witnessed a rapid growth of this trade. Our exports to Mexico, which in the last fiscal year were in round numbers \$46,000,000, have increased three and a half times since 1890, and our imports, which were last year \$44,000,000, have practically doubled. Railroad building is the great cause for the growth. The through lines have given our merchants advantages which merchants of other countries do not have, and which are still lacking to us in our trade with the Central American states. The Mexicans take \$2,000,000 worth of our coal and the same amount of our raw cotton a year. They spend about \$2,000,000 each for our cars and carriages, locomotives, mineral and vegetable oils and lumber. Half a million dollars or more of their money is paid out for scientific instruments, for electrical machinery, for builders' hardware, for sewing machines and for furniture. Fate has decreed that we are only to have two immediate neighbors on the continent, Mexico and Canada. Both of them are good neighbors, commercially and otherwise. The more neighborly they get the better.

### ELEVATION AND CLIMATE.

All Are Familiar with Relation of One to the Other—Facts and Figures.

Everybody is familiar with the fact that elevation affects the climate. In California snow-capped mountains are numerous in summer, while in the plains below snow seldom falls in the coldest weather of winter. But how many readers can tell at what rate elevation produces a change of temperature? In Draper's great work of "The Intellectual Development of Europe," elevation of Europe since the tertiary period of more than 2,000 feet, he remarks that "an elevation of 500 feet is equal to one degree of cold in the mean annual temperature, or to 64 inches on the surface toward." At this rate the top of a mountain 15,000 feet high would be almost 43 degrees colder than the general elevation at the base; and so when the thermometer shows a temperature of 55 degrees at the base it would be ten degrees below the freezing point at the top of 23 degrees Fahrenheit. With the temperature at 100 on the plains it would be only 57 at the top of the mountain. The temperature at mountain resorts may easily be determined in this way, if the elevation is known, as compared with that of Los Angeles, for example.
